Queer Pictures From Many Lands Competing for \$1,000 in Prizes



THE nation-wide photographic contest for \$1,000 in prizes offered by the Copper and Brass Research Association for photographs showing the durability of copper, brass and bronze has brought replies from all over the country and photographs taken in Europe and America of objects some of which date back twenty-five centuries.

One of the most interesting entries to date is a copper bucket found in an underground dungeon at the demolition of the old Newgate prison, London, dating back to the time of William the Conqueror (1066 A. D.). The bucket is at least 500 years old.

Another is the photograph of an old bronze Etruscan chariot buried near Monteleone in the sixth century B. C. and recovered in 1902 in almost perfect condition.
