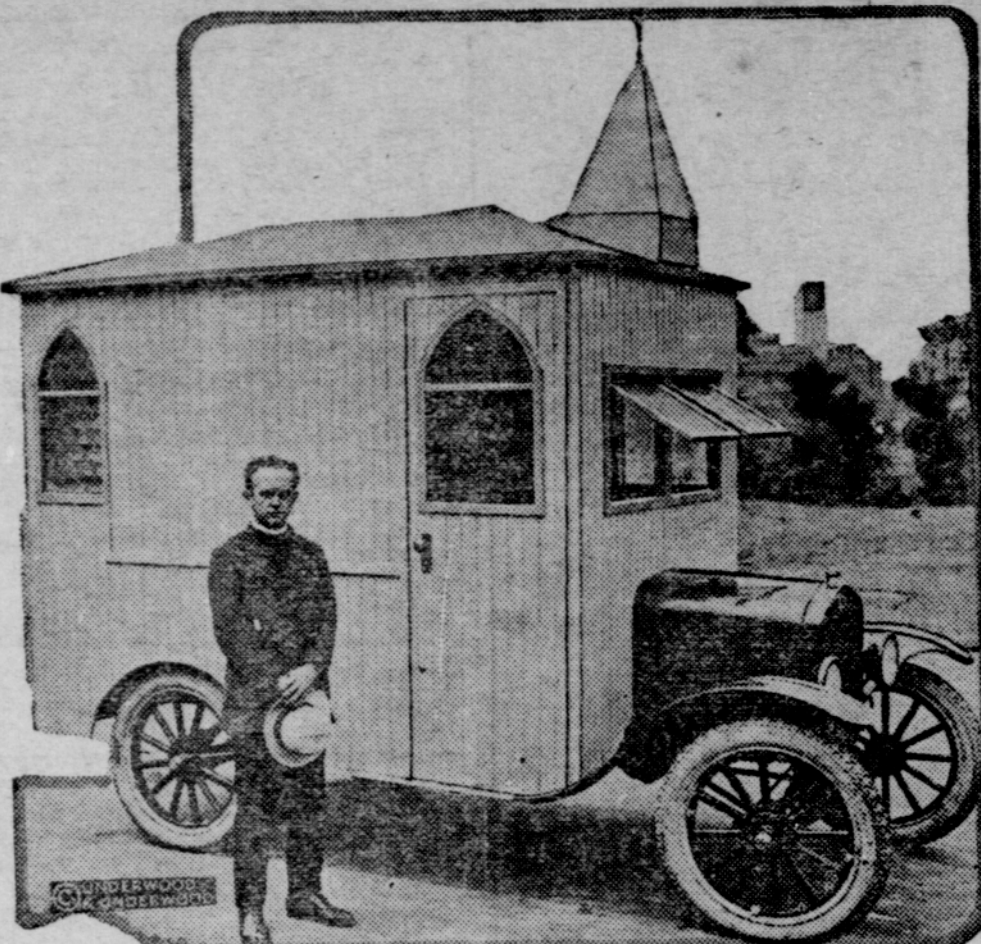

**England's Star Chamber.**

The Star chamber was a tribunal in England consisting of a committee of the king's privy council, instituted or revived by Henry VII in 1486. It had extensive powers and held itself unfettered by rules of law, dealt with civil and criminal cases without the intervention of a jury, and could inflict any form of punishment short of death. It was abolished by parliament in 1641, during the reign of Charles I. The court is said to have derived its name either from the gilt stars that adorned the ceiling of the chamber in the old palace at Westminster, where it held its sessions, or, as is more probable, from the Jewish bonds (stars) deposited there by permission of William I.
