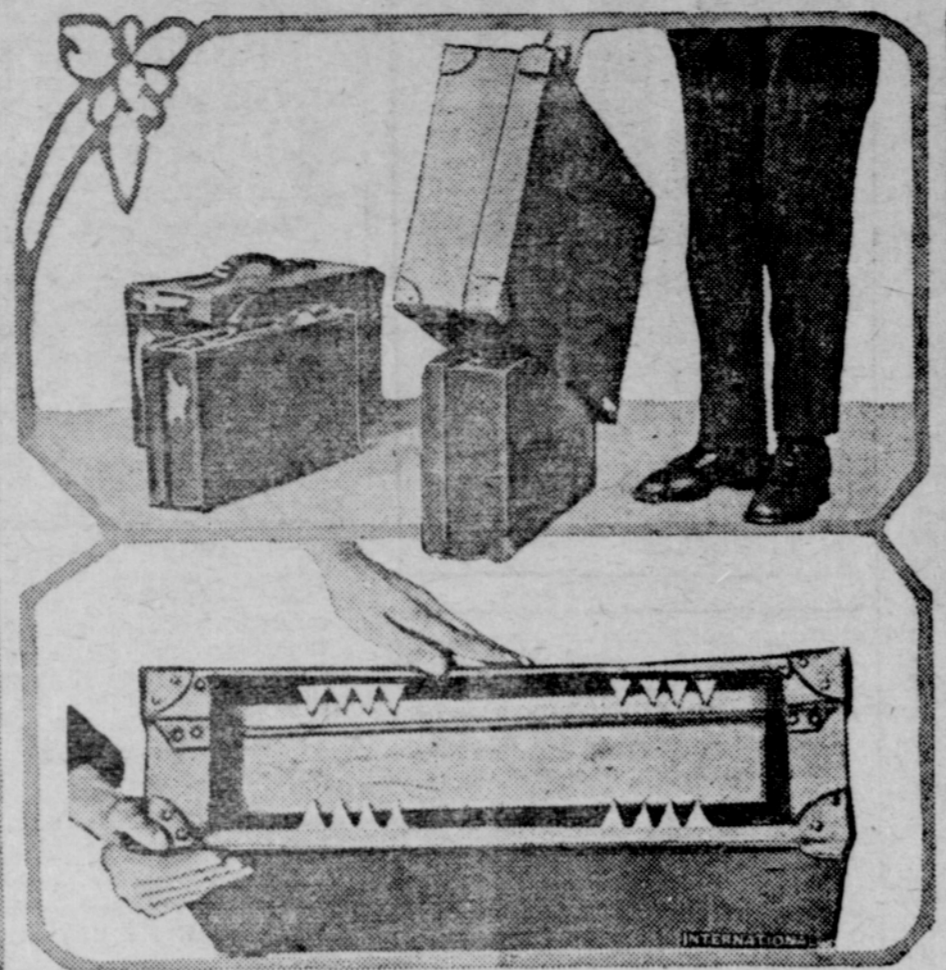
SAND BAR HOLDS

LUMBER SCHOONER
ASTORIA, Or., Sept. 11.—As a result of piling the lumber of her deckload too high, the steamer schooner H. B. Lovejoy, which loaded lumber at Rainier for San Pedro, has lost part of her cargo, her hold has six feet of water in it, and the vessel is aground on a sand bar in the Columbia river opposite Rainier. It was shortly after the craft left her moorings at the Menefee mill at Rainier and headed for the sea that she took a decided list, losing a portion of her deckload and careening so far over to one side that she shipped water.

BUS OPERATIONS EXCEED

THOSE OF RAILROADS

SALEM, Or., Sept. 11.—Statistics prepared by the Oregon public service commission here show that 373 franchises to operate commercial passenger automobiles and trucks in the state have been issued since the law requiring these permits was approved by the legislature last winter.

Although the commissioners have not been able to compute the exact mileage covered by these franchises, it was said that their operations cover a larger territory and more miles than are served by the several railroad systems in Oregon.
