RAILROAD IS BOMBED IN EASTERN OREGON

PENDLETON, Or., Sept. 13.—The railroad right of way was damaged and windows broken by a dynamite bomb which exploded as it rolled under a rail at the town of Umatilla, yard center of the O-W. R. & N. company, about midnight Saturday, it was learned here today. Failure of a defective fuse to explode a second bomb of larger dimensions probably saved the lives of nearly 40 workmen who were sleeping in a Pullman car in the Umatilla yards. Special agents and members of the sheriff's force working on the case have not yet found any clues.

EXCAVATION WORK NEARLY DONE ON ENDERS BUILDING

The excavation for the new wholesale house of H. G. Enders is nearing completion, and the cement foundations for the large building will be put in place within the next few days.

The building will be located at the corner of Oak and A streets, and will cover a lot some 150 feet square with a small office at the intersection of the two streets.

Mr. Enders has been in the wholesale business for the past few months, and is erecting the new building to have a sufficiently large storage room to care for all the possibilities of the business for the next few years.

MILLION DOLLAR LOSS FROM ASTORIA BLAZE

ASTORIA, Or., Sept. 13.—A property loss of close to \$1,000,000 was sustained, more than 500 men were deprived of employment and the city was robbed of a payroll exceeding \$75,000 a month by a fire, the most disastrous Astoria has suffered in many months, which started at 5 o'clock Monday afternoon and destroyed the Hammond Lumber company's mill, two dry kilns, with their contents, and the big power plant. The outer docks, an elevated tramway, a large quantity of lumber and a substantial portion of the lumber stored in the yards were saved.

About 20 railway cars loaded with lumber ready for shipment were hauled away from the plant to safety while the fire was in progress.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 13.—Sixty-two fires in Oregon, outside of Portland, during August, resulted in losses aggregating \$355,908, according to the monthly summary prepared by A. C. Barber, state fire marshal. Of the 62 fires, 24 were in dwellings, 12 in barns, five in sawmills, four in garages, four in hotels, and six in business houses.

ADVERTISEMENT FOR PROPOSALS TO CONSTRUCT CEMENT SIDEWALKS, CURB AND GUTTER.

Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received by the Common Council of the city of Ashland, Oregon, until 5 o'clock p. m., Saturday, September 23, 1922, to furnish all material and labor necessary to construct cement sidewalks, curbs and gutters on South Pioneer avenue, First street and Second street, between the points designated, save and except such parts thereof as property owners may construct.

Cement sidewalks and curbs and gutters are to be constructed by the city on First street from East Main street to Hargadine street, excepting therefrom the property of H. G. Enders; also on the east side of Second street, between East Main street and Hargadine street, excepting therefrom properties where cement walks have already been laid and property of H. G. Enders. Cement sidewalks only are to be constructed by the city on the west side of South Pioneer avenue from East Main street to the main entrance of the Chautauqua building, and on the east side of South Pioneer avenue from East Main street to Hargadine street.

A certified check for \$25.00 payable to the city of Ashland must accompany all bids, which is to be forfeited to the city in case the successful bidder shall fail to execute a contract and furnish an approved bond for the faithful performance of such contract, within five days after notification of acceptance of the bid.

Bidders must examine the ground for the walks, curb and gutter, in order that no misunderstanding may exist.

The council reserves the right to reject any and all bids. The contract price is to be paid from special assessments for benefits accruing from such sidewalk, curb and gutter to the respective properties.


