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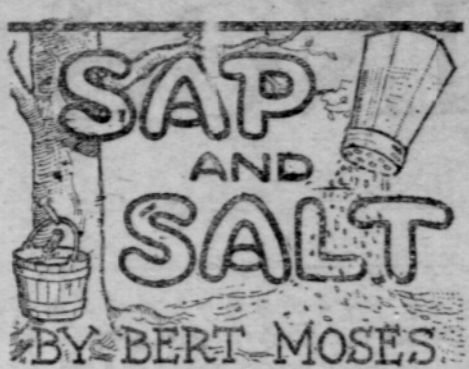

The block is bounded by Bush, Lawson, Maple and High streets. It is on the hill west of the main business part of the town. At no time were any business buildings endangered.

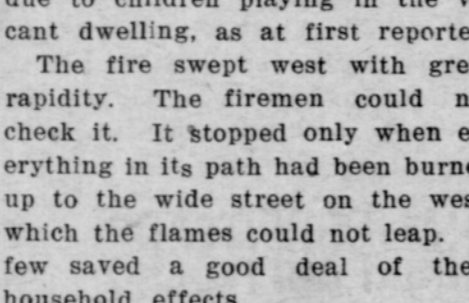

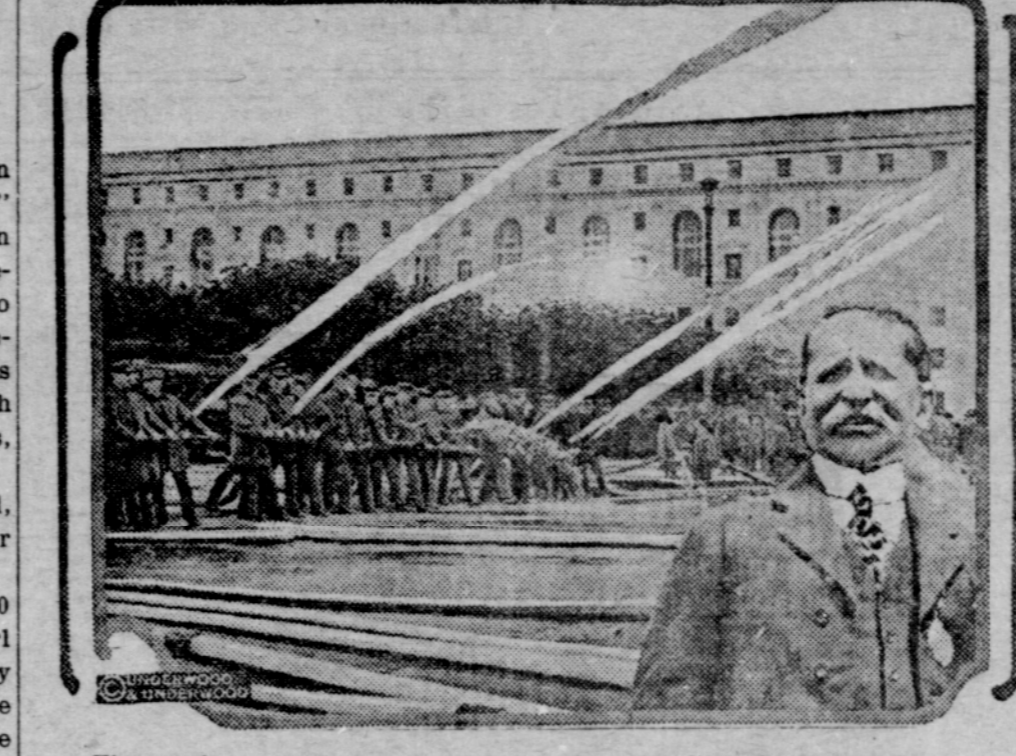
