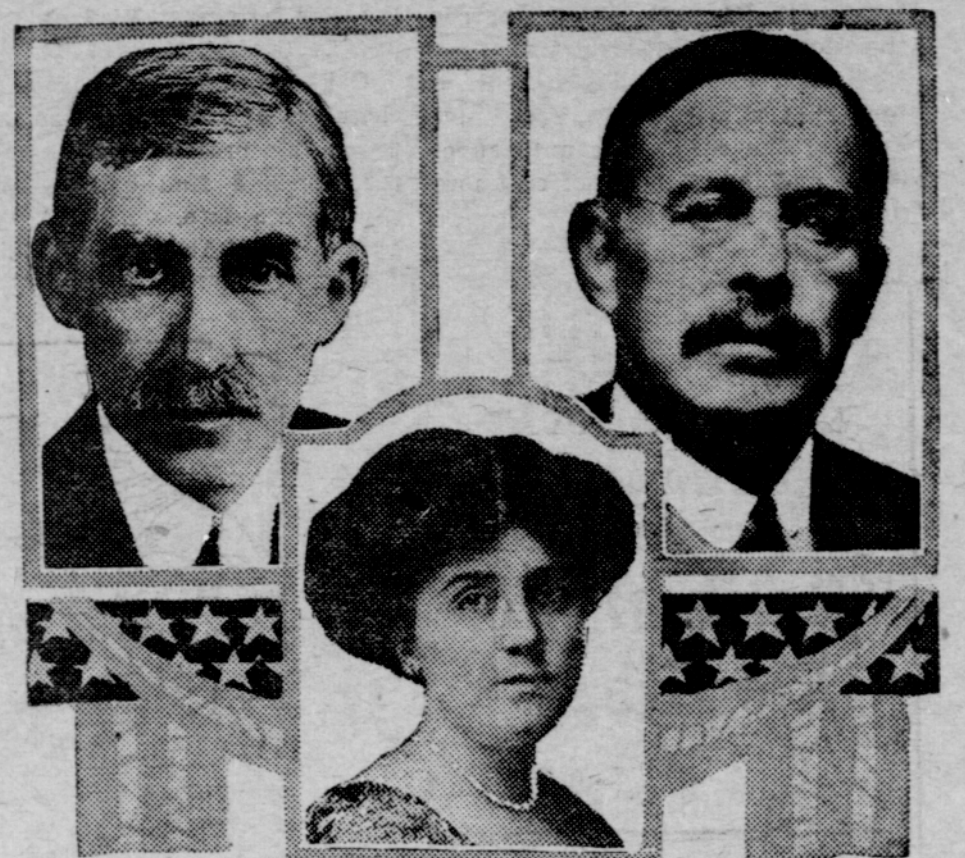
National Security League Appoints Committee on Constitutional Instruction for Work in State Legislatures.

A law, requiring definite courses of instruction in the Constitution of the United States in all public schools, will be placed on the statute books of all the states when the work of the Committee on Constitutional Instruction, recently appointed by the National Security League, is completed.

Lloyd Taylor, secretary of the National Security League, and a retired New York business man, who has devoted his attention in recent years to patriotic and welfare work, is chairman of the Committee on Constitutional Instruction. This committee has a membership of 200 which includes the presidents of practically all the leading colleges and universities of the country.

John J. Tigert, U. S. Commissioner of Education; Miss Charl Williams, President of the National Education Association; Miss Maude Wetmore, Chairman of the Woman's Department of the National Civic Federation; James M. Beck, Solicitor General of the United States; A. E. Winship, editor of the "Journal of Education"; Thomas W. Churchill, former president of the New York City Board of Education, and Martin J. Wade, U. S. District Judge for Iowa.

Five States Have Statute—Five states—Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, Vermont and Rhode Island—now have a law requiring definite courses of instruction in the Constitution of the United States in their public schools. The National Security League secured the passage of this law in Rhode Island last spring. Mr. Taylor's Committee has secured approval of the bill

from the Joint Educational Committee of the Georgia Legislature and its passage is expected before this body adjourns.

Intensive work in the legislatures of twenty states the coming winter has been planned and the Committee counts on the aid of individual members of the National Security League, other patriotic societies, the American Legion, Women's Clubs and other organizations.

The National Security League started the movement for a general observance on September 17 of Constitution Day in 1919. The committee having the work in hand was under the direction of Dr. David Jayne Hill, historian and diplomat, who is now a member of the League's Board of Directors.

The League's "Catechism"

The League's "Catechism of the Constitution of the United States" is an

officially recognized textbook in the public schools and it is used in alien classes and by the agencies promoting the education of applicants for citizenship.

The need for the Committee on Constitutional Instruction was discovered when Miss Etta V. Leighton, the League's Civic Secretary, made a survey of the public schools of the country. The survey was made to classify various methods of Constitutional instruction in order to obtain the best standard for universal adoption. A contest among grammar school pupils was conducted by the League in connection with the survey, and prizes were awarded for the best suggestions for the dramatization, by pageants or charades, of the principal provisions of the Constitution. School children in only fourteen states competed and the discovery was made that the Constitution was most inadequately taught.

REPUBLICAN TARIFF BILL GIVEN SECOND DEFEAT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—A second attempt to send the new republican tariff bill back to the conference, was defeated in the house today, 193 to 108.

WAR RECORD IS USED AS BAIT FOR LECTURE

REDDING, Calif., Sept. 16.—That Colonel Dan Morgan Smith, who says he was the commander of the "Battalion of Death," is using his war record as a camouflage to get an audience to hear a talk in favor of the Wright Enforcement act, was the charge made by those who heard him speak here Wednesday evening.

The lecture was advertised as "World's War and the Fields of France," to be a free lecture with motion pictures. A large crowd turned out. Some of those who attended say the war part of the discourse lasted about five minutes. Then ensued a half hour discourse on the Wright act. Another 30 minutes was used in passing the hat. The latter act did not yield much return and the fact was commented upon by the speaker in rather caustic terms.

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 16.—Resolutions requesting congress to enact a law prohibiting the transportation of inflammable films in interstate commerce, effective January 1, 1925, were adopted by the Fire Marshal's association of North America in convention here. Copies of the resolution were sent to the president and to all members of congress.

"The use of inflammable films in theatres and other public places is detrimental to public safety and largely increase the fire risk," the resolution said.
