LITTLE TALKS ON THRIFT

IT IS difficult to break away from old habits, and, for this reason the hardest dollar to save generally is the first one.



After the start in saving money has been made, the way becomes continually easier because the new habits of life gradually become more fixed.

The reason many persons do not practice thrift is not that they do not appreciate its advantages, but they never can bring themselves to the point of making the start.

It should be borne in mind also the amount of money one saves at the beginning is not of importance. The chief factor in the process is making the actual start.

Make the start in thrift today. Do not be even discouraged if the first sum you save is only a few pennies.

The important question is not how much, but when.

FIVE PRIZE WINNING GREEN OLIVE RECIPES



Here are five of the prize-winning recipes in a recent contest among New England housewives. They are well worth trying.

Green Olive Lilies
Spread butterthins evenly with cream cheese. Place one-half of stuffed olive on center of each. These look pretty and are delicious served with tea or coffee.

Boston Girls' Sandwich
One slice each of white and brown bread, cut thin and buttered, cover with lettuce leaf, spread well with mashed cold baked beans, thickly strewn with finely chopped Spanish green olives.

Olive Tart Salad
Four tart apples, three-fourths cup Spanish green olives, one stalk celery, one-half cup walnut meats. Cut olives, apples and celery into small pieces, moisten with mayonnaise and cover with chopped nuts. Serve in a nest of lettuce.

Norwegian Sandwich
To one can sardines add one tablespoon chopped green olives, juice of one-half lemon, dash paprika and grain of salt. Make a paste of all. Spread between graham bread sliced thin.

Celery, Olives and Cheese
Chop one small-sized bottle of stuffed olives. Mix with pimento cheese. Salt and pepper to taste. Place the mixture in the grooves of the celery.
