Paul Whiteman Sends Orchestras 'Round World

Paul Whiteman, famous orchestra leader is taking American jazz 'round the world with all the blare and rhythm intact. He is achieving this in each case by sending an orchestra along to play the music. In Australia, and in Brazil, where

a great international exposition has just opened, the flappers are stepping to "Tricks," Whiteman's new jazz hit, and in Paris and Deauville smart continental society is dancing to the same all-American tune. "For a long time, other countries have been interested in our jazz," Mr. Whiteman declares. "They loved it when they heard it in this country, but for some reason they

declared it never sounded the same when they got it back home." "Of course the reason for that was that it takes Americans to play American jazz. Now we are sending them jazz players and jazz instruments along with 'Tricks' and other jazz favorites. "It's working wonderfully and I guess it's safe by this time to say that American jazz leads world dancing."

Movieland Notes

Plays for Players Arthur Freed, composer and lyricist of "Hindustan," "Louisiana," "Cairo," and "When Budha Smiles," among other popular songs and instrumental hits of the day, contributed his services as musician during the filming of the Thomas Meghan picture, "The Bachelor Daddy," showing tomorrow and Monday at the Vining theatre.

Mr. Freed is a friend of Alfred Green, who directed this new Paramount picture, and in New York the director suggested that he should take a look at the picture industry in its native element in Hollywood, so the composer decided to follow his advice, and "went west."

A small organ was Mr. Freed's instrument in this case. It was compact and could be taken on location for outside scenes also. In the tense or dramatic scenes of the picture, Mr. Freed's art was frequently called into play, with appreciable effects.

William Beaudine, who directed Wesley Barry in "Little Heroes of the Street," cast his little youngster for a part in the picture. When the scene was filmed the little fellow could not walk, but crawled on his hands and knees. Recently Beaudine, in looking over the film, discovered that a mistake had been made in the photography, and that his youngster had to go through another crawling scene. But when they started shooting William Jr. rose up on all fours and walked through the scene. Not even "Pops" most officious directorial voice could persuade the baby that his old form of locomotion was superior to the newly discovered one. Beaudine had to film some 500 feet of negative, and the youngster proudly walked through the scene.

Production has begun at Universal City on a series of eight two-reelers adapted from Jack London's celebrated "Tales of the Fish Patrol," virile short stories of the marine police, who preserve order among the lawless foreign fishermen in the waters around San Francisco. Jack Mulhall is starred in the series.

Wesley Barry, who recently completed "Little Heroes of the Street," the second picture made by Harry Rapf for the Warner Brothers, will

shortly start on another personal appearance tour throughout the country.

Production of the Charles G. Norris novel, "Brass," has been started by Harry Rapf at the Warner Brothers coast studios, with Marie Prevost in the leading role, and Sidney Franklin as director.

TELLS OF ESKIMO MELODIES

Arctic Explorer Declares They Are Weird and Wistful to a Degree, and Characteristic.

Knud Rasmussen and Fridtjof Nansen and also Hinrich Johannes Rink, who was sent north years ago by Lady Franklin to find her husband, have given to the world valuable facts about the customs and lives of the Eskimos, the Detroit News observes. Christian Leden's unique contribution from the arctic regions is in the field of music. For years he studied and faithfully transcribed the Inuit melodies. Each Eskimo, he says, is obliged to compose his own song, and no person may sing the song of another without first obtaining permission. The mother has her cradle song, infinitely low and sweet. The hunter has his song of the chase, clear and bold. Even the bad man of the tribe has his song, and it was quick and appropriately brazen.

Harmony has not been developed among the Eskimos. They sing only in unison. But their melodies are weird and wistful, often consisting of only two or three notes, which are strangely effective.

It is during the long polar night that the Eskimo has time to rest in his igloo and sing his songs.

Speech Over-Fatigued. In the United States there is sometimes a peculiar tendency to avoid the use of certain every-day words—at one time it was considered indelicate to refer to the legs of a table when the word "supports" was available—operations, other than "majors," are now referred to as "repair work." Only the other day in London a woman from the United States mentioned that a friend of hers had had some "repair work" done—meaning that she had been operated on. Of course, no inquiry as to the nature of the "repairs" is permissible.
