

gated the tragedy, together with Sheriff Barnes, when it was reported here by Hesse yesterday, said the accident occurred about 9 o'clock at night. Fish and Hesse had been deer hunting and had separated to go around a knoll. Hesse came upon barren during the dryer part of the some deer but failed to bring one down. He had sat on a rock to await their coming when he heard them returning, apparently frightened by Fish, who, unknown to Hesse, was approaching from another direction. It was then about dark but Hesse saw something move and fired. He heard the deer going through the brush and, concluding he had missed

When Fish failed to return some time later, a search was instituted, which resulted in the finding of his body about 50 yards from the place where Hesse had shot. The bullet from Hesse's 30-30 rifle had penetrated Fish's neck, killing him in-
