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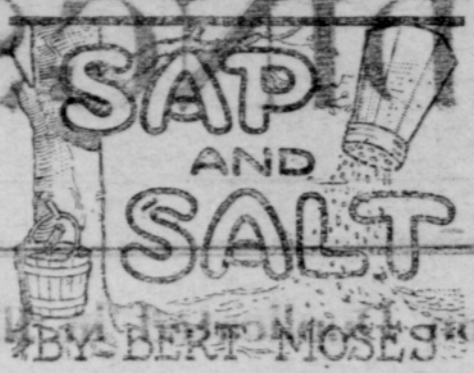
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OUR SENATOR

Adapt Wireless Principles to Reducing

Dr. Frank B. Schanne Is One of the Inventors of Electro-Magnetic Wave Bath, Which Shakes Off Fat Unknown to Patient.

New York City.—Is the invention of a well known neurologist merely the forerunner of putting wireless to new use—namely that of reducing the "too, too solid flesh" of humans, as well as treating them for nervous diseases and ailments? Will the day come when the homes of the flesh-burdened will be equipped with a cabinet connected with antennae of a certain sort and at a fixed hour will the sufferers from too much avoidplops enter these cabinets for their reducing period, just as at the present time certain adjustments are made to the receiving set for news and concerts from the central broadcasting stations?
 Dr. Frank B. Schanne of 244 Madison Ave. New York City, and Dr. William S. Benson of Newark, N. J., are the inventors of the Electro-Magnetic Wave Bath, which is arousing great interest among physicians, among whose patients are numbered those subject to nervous diseases and those who wish to reduce. Strange as it may appear to the average man the apparatus will aid both classes of sufferers, but of course the treatment will be different for different ailments or afflictions.

It May be Used Some Day
 Dr. Schanne does not claim the day will ever come when the apparatus, as it now is, can be operated from a central broadcasting station, but there are interesting possibilities in the thought and the principle of the wireless is used in the device. And then since one knows what a few more improvements in the radio will bring forth it is not too much to say it is possible.

The inventors do claim that their machine incorporates in one operation the treatments for which several machines have heretofore been required. They say that instead of separate devices to give light, heat, electricity and magnetism the Electro-Magnetic Wave Bath will give them all at one time to the great benefit of the patient. The patient does not know this muscular action is taking place, and does not feel the electric current that is doing the work, since he does not touch wires or plates and does not come in direct contact with it in any way. He is merely in the field of the electricity and the wireless waves flow across the cabinet and through his body, setting up a healthy vibration in his muscles and tissues.
