

Floating Islands.

Natural floating islands sometimes are seen in the Mississippi and other rivers, and in lakes, occasionally being of sufficient size to serve as pastures. They are formed of earth which is held together in a compact form by roots interlacing, and they float because they are not heavy enough nor sufficiently waterlogged to sink. They have their origin in river banks which have been torn away and carried down steam by a powerful current, and sometimes trees remain growing on these islands. Artificial floating islands are made by taking rafts of wickerwork, covering them with reeds, and then placing lake mud on top. They are used by some of the natives of India, Persia and Thibet to grow cucumbers, melons and other plants which require a lot of water. Artificial islands of this nature at one time were used in the waters about Mexico.

Bank of England.

The Bank of England was founded by William Paterson (1658-1719), a long-headed Lowland Scot from Tinwald parish, in Dumfriesshire, skillful in finance and in matters of trade. It was the first public bank in Great Britain and was chartered in 1694. It was projected to meet the difficulty experienced by King William III in raising the supplies for the war against France. By the influence of William Paterson and Michael Godfrey, 40 merchants (aided by Charles Montague) subscribed £500,000 toward the sum of £1,200,000 to be lent to the government at 8 per cent, in consideration of the subscribers being incorporated as a bank. The project was strongly opposed in parliament. but the bill secured the royal assent April 25, 1694.
