"COMMONS" ONLY IN NAME

Delegates to Early English National Assembly Belonged Without Exception to Proprietary Class.

As early as 1254 in England, knights were called from the shires to the national assembly to testify to the taxable capacity of their districts.

At first the custom had no purpose except the desire of the taxing body to keep in close financial touch with the towns and districts. But soon Simon de Montfort, in rebellion against Henry III, turned it into a gathering to express and discuss grievances against the king.

The difference, however, was no more than relative. For in this early house of commons there were no common men in the modern conception of the term. They were all men of property, many as wealthy and influential as the great peers, and, indeed, frequently they were the sons and younger brothers of these peers.

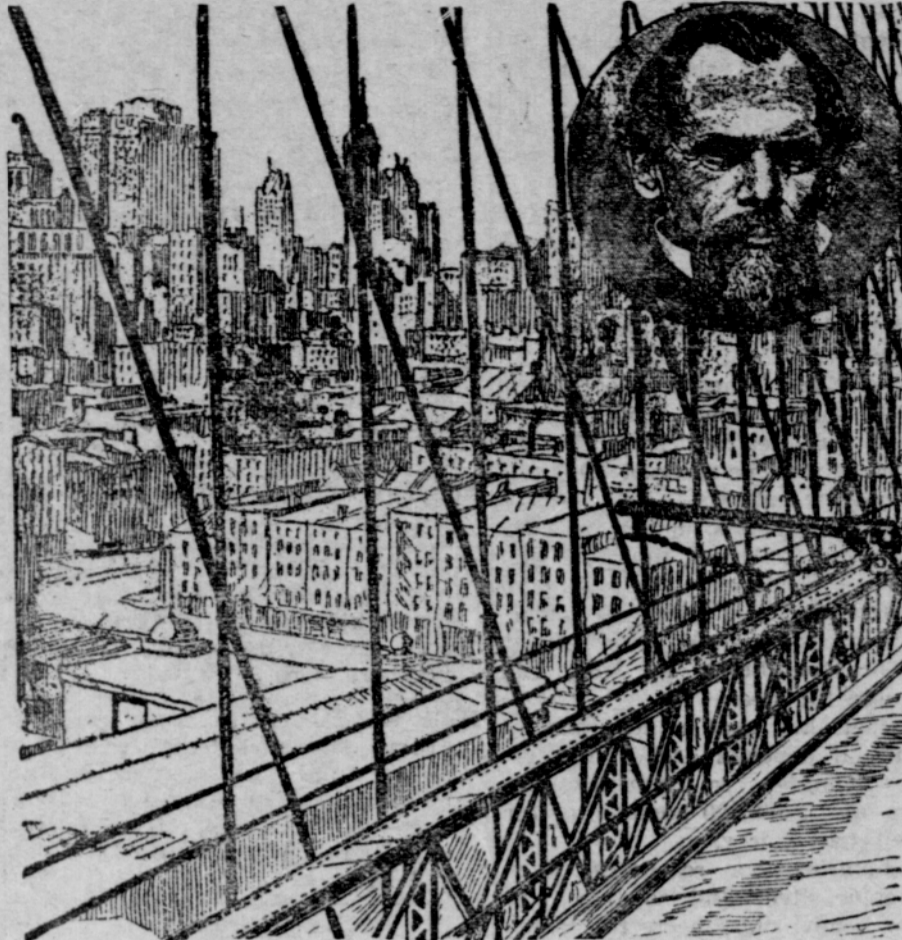
What the Mouth Denotes.

When Roebling Built Brooklyn Bridge He Provided for Overcrowding

ONE of the periodic cries that the Brooklyn Bridge is not safe because of the traffic overcrowding of trains and motor vehicles having recently been stilled by the statements of engineers who know the facts, the whole picturesque romance of the building of the bridge has been again recalled.

When Col. Washington A. Roebling, who wove the great wire cables over plans made by his father, John A. Roebling, announced the other day that the bridge was good for many years to come, he spoke from a knowledge of long forgotten facts.

Col. Roebling still directs the work of his company. Part of its war service consisted of the 80,000,000 feet of Roebling wire cable, now reposing on the floor of the North Sea, which was once a part of the mine barrage.

OREGON SCHOOLS AND ROADS RECEIVE GOVERNMENT AID

Oregon has just received \$110,015.21, from the federal government for use in building roads and maintaining schools, the amount being 25 per cent of the receipts from the national forests in Oregon during the year.

The total amount accruing to the nation for road and school expenditures from national forests receipts is \$846,442.41 for roads and schools, and \$338,576.96, for forest roads and trails.
