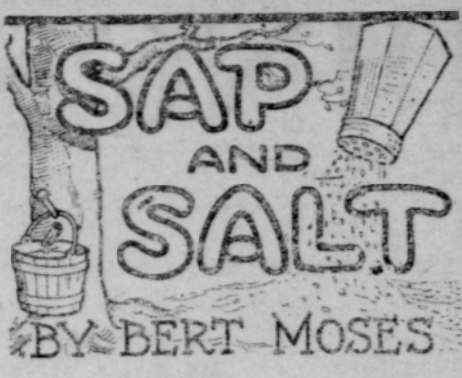

He is the possessor of a pure and simple faith in the power of God to fulfill the promises that He has made, and to God he gives credit for whatever measure of success that has attended the meetings here.

Many people do not believe in the revival meeting. Be that as it may, even the most unbelieving cannot honestly claim that Ashland has not been benefited morally as a result of the presence of Dr. Price in the city for one month. Those that already believed in the Holy Spirit received a renewal of their faith, while many were brought to see the light. Perhaps in many cases there is no actual realization of spirituality manifested, but the intangible force is present. Ashland cannot help but being a better community as a result of the short visit of the evangelist.

Though Dr. Price has left the city, perhaps never to return, the impress of his stay will remain forever. In this world there are but too few men such as he. Thank God for Dr. Charles S. Price, of Lodi, California.

ENTIRE DALLAS, OR., FAMILY REPORTED TO BE MISSING

DALLAS, Or., Oct. 3.—Some where between Yellowstone national park and this city an entire family has disappeared. On September 8, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond G. Little and their two daughters, three and five years old respectively, left the national park riding in a motorcycle and sidecar. They were coming to Dallas for an extended visit with Mrs. Little's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Davis. Since their departure nothing has been heard from them.

Little, who had been employed for some time as a forest ranger in Yellowstone national park, is believed to have carried several thousand dollars on his person, as he recently came into possession of a small fortune in the settlement of an estate. He is described at 33 years old, of light complexion and weighing about 165 pounds, while his wife is 22 years old, light complexion and of slender build.

Miss Duncan said that they showed at the hearing that she and her husband were anti-Bolsheviks, having been arrested several times by the bolsheviks. Asked why she was detained, she replied sarcastically: "For classical dancing."

HEN ALMOST LAYS AN EGG A DAY FOR A YEAR

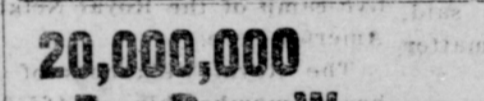

Outfielder and leading slugger of the St. Louis Browns. Has led both leagues the greater part of the season in home runs, getting most of them at Sportsman's Park, St. Louis. Good fielder, fine base runner.

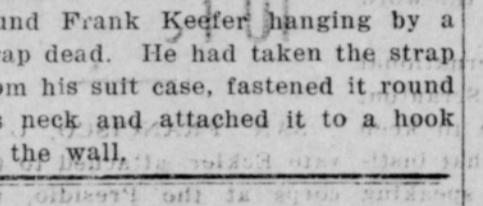
Broke into the game with Regina, of the Western Canada league, in 1913; shifted to Edmonton, of the same league, the following year; then on to Spokane, of the Northwest league, in 1915 hitting 345 in 79 games. He finished the season with the Cincinnati Reds, hitting 242 in 71 games, and 111 in ten games in 1916, whereupon the Reds sent him on his way to Portland.

In 1917 he had a great year with Portland, batting .311 and stealing 69 bases. That got him a job with the Browns in 1918, and he has been with them ever since. He hit 347 last year, his best season.

"I will not tolerate any man to serve as a juror on any case before me, who is affiliated with any such organization."

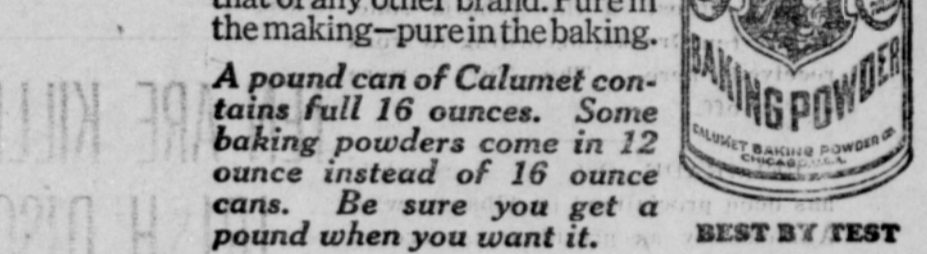
