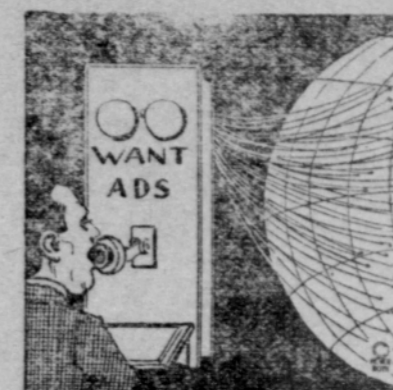
A height of more than 7,000 feet has been reached by balloonists. Basking sharks, the largest known variety, grow to thirty-two feet.
