CORNERSTONE LAID TODAY FOR MEMORIAL TO RILEY—INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 7.—Indiana paid tribute today to the memory of the Hoosier "Children's Poet," James Whitcomb Riley. On the anniversary of the birth of the famous poet, the cornerstone of the Riley memorial, the James Whitcomb Riley hospital for children, was laid. The hospital will be a \$2,000,000 institution, erected through contributions from persons in all sections of the state, and will be devoted exclusively to the care and treatment of sick and crippled children of Indiana.

The hospital movement started before the war, but was delayed by the war. Since the movement has again been started, scores of organizations in all parts of Indiana have started the raising of funds to memorialize their own organizations within the completed hospital.
