EASERN STATES HELD IN GRIP OF DROUGHT


WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 .- With another 24 hours of generally fair weather forecast for the entire section of the country, from the plains states eastward, the United States weather bureau saw no immediate prospect yesterday for a break in the protracted drought which has gripped a great portion of the country. for the season, which yesterday established records at a number of points in the east and middle west, also were expected to continue at least until tonight.

Despite the extent and intensity of the drought, the damage to crops has been exceedingly small, agriculturists declare. The most serious effect has been the retarding of winter wheat sowing.
