MUTILATED TORSO LOCATED IN PARK

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—The ghastly discovery of a severed head in a sack in Bronx Park, last Sunday was augmented by the finding of a mutilated human torso, part of the same body. Police renewed their "fine tooth" combing of the park for other parts of the murdered man, for such surgeons have pronounced the victim, but they believe that the murderers or their agents are coming again with the severed limbs of the corpse. They believe the torso was placed in the park Thursday. It was wedged between two rocks. Efforts at identification have failed.

KLAN HEAD INDICTED UPON FRAUD CHARGES

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 7.—E. Y. Clarke, imperial wizard pro tem of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, was indicted by the United States grand jury here, on charges of "using the mails to defraud." He was released on bond of \$500.

The charges against Clarke, who Wednesday announced his resignation as pro tempore head of the Klan to take effect November 10, were based, according to the true bill rendered by the grand jury, on alleged use of the mails in collecting money from certain members, subordinate officers and employes of the Ku Klux Klan on the pretense that such moneys would be used to pay premiums to surety companies furnishing bonds for these klansmen.

EASERN STATES HELD IN GRIP OF DROUGHT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—With another 24 hours of generally fair weather forecast for the entire section of the country, from the plains states eastward, the United States weather bureau saw no immediate prospect yesterday for a break in the protracted drought which has gripped a great portion of the country. Attending high temperatures for the season, which yesterday established records at a number of points in the east and middle west, also were expected to continue at least until tonight.

Despite the extent and intensity of the drought, the damage to crops has been exceedingly small, agriculturists declare. The most serious effect has been the retarding of winter wheat sowing.

BABY STILLMAN HELD TO BE LEGITIMATE SON

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Oct. 7.—Mrs. Anna U. Stillman won another victory in her divorce proceedings yesterday, when Supreme Court Justice Morschauer handed down a decision approving and confirming the findings and recommendations of Referee Gleason. In his decision, Gleason had held that Baby Guy Stillman was a legitimate son of James A. Stillman, New York banker; that Mrs. Stillman was not guilty of infidelity; that Stillman had been guilty of misconduct, and that Stillman was not entitled to a divorce.
