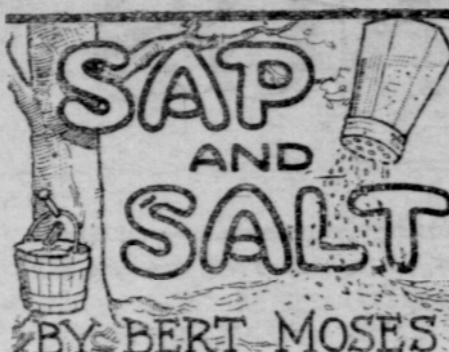

Land Opening Board Subject Of Meet Today

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 11.—A. P. Davis, director of the United States reclamation service; F. B. Headley, superintendent of the federal experiment farm at Fallon, Nev., and Glenn L. Parker, district engineer of the United States geodetic survey, of Tacoma, Wash., compose the board of review which meets here today to consider opening of from 10,000 to 15,000 acres more of Tule lake lands to homesteading, and other matters.
The matter of compensation for J. Frank Adams for reclamation work on the Hanks marsh will be investigated at the session.
In his letter appointing the board Secretary Fall says:
"It is desired that the board consider the area of irrigable land in the Tule lake division of the Klamath project which can at this time be opened to entry and also suggest a program of development for the opening of additional lands to experienced men who have a preferential right to make entry therefor."
"Hanks marsh is a small area near the southeastern end of Upper Klamath lake, which has been partially protected from overflow by a levee. It is desired that the lands in this area be studied with a view to reporting on their agricultural value when properly protected from the waters of the lake, together with such other pertinent features as the board may deem advisable to report upon."
"The Klamath Falls post of the

American Legion has expressed much interest in these matters, and it is therefore suggested that the board give an opportunity to the post to present its views and that it also

afford the Klamath irrigation district and other local organizations similar opportunity."

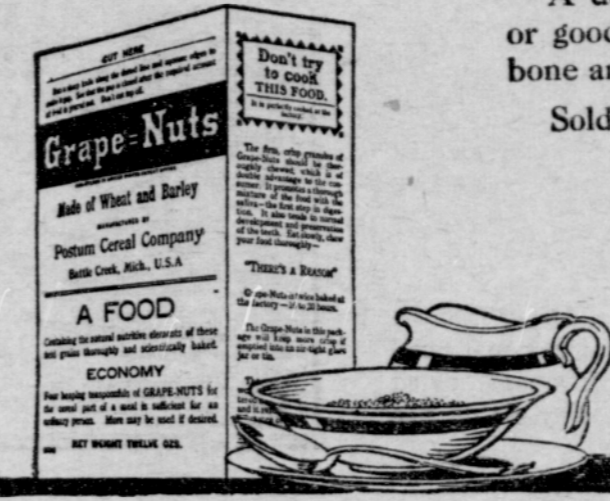
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THE LOOMIS TICKET PLATFORM

The seventh paragraph of the Loomis platform is exceedingly important. It is this: "I believe that when the people vote in favor of anything they should get it, and I am opposed to all forms of trickery, particularly the so-called 'jokers' that are often used to deceive the voters. I believe that being on the level is the highest form of American citizenship."
More than two years ago, the people voted on, or thought they were voting on, a one hundred thousand dollar bond issue to augment Ashland's water supply. They voted for it in good faith, and it was adopted by their votes. They waited long for the administration to begin work on the project. At last the public became restless. The water supply was inadequate to the needs of the growers and domestic consumers, and a demand arose for immediate action, when, lo and behold, they were informed that the administration never intended to carry out the thing for which the people thought they were voting. Purposely, a joker had been placed in the measure, leaving the matter entirely to the council, and it elected to ignore it, in spite of the expressed will of the electors of the city, plainly expressed at the bond election. Mr. Loomis and the candidates for councilmen on his ticket, do not believe

in that sort of business.

Several of the candidates on the Blake ticket were members of the council at the time, and many aggrieved citizens are criticizing them severely for being parties to the water joker episode. We think justly so. This experience leads many citizens to express the fear that the present agitation in the council for the Neil creek project has another joker in it and that instead of being a straightforward, bona fide attempt to get more water for the city that it is likely being done for the purpose of allaying certain opposition to the re-election of the present council, aroused by the present council's failure to carry out, in good faith, the expressed will of the citizens in the past.

At the council meeting held September 20, another proposal regarding the Ashland creek canyon was ordered put on the ballot to be voted on at the November city election, which reads as follows:

"Shall the common council adopt a policy of opening up Ashland creek canyon and watershed to further extension of roads and scenic drives, with strict camping and picnicking prohibitions, or shall further development of roadways, except such as are needed by the municipal work of the city, be discouraged?"

That looks like another joker. Read the ballot title over carefully, Mr. Reader, and find its meaning if you can. The language of the measure is such that if you vote for closing the canyon, you don't, and if

ALIEN WOMEN IN OREGON CAN NOT CAST BALLOTS

Alien women in Oregon and American born women who are wives of unaturalized aliens, will not be allowed to vote in the coming election, even though they file petitions under the new naturalization law. This statement was made by Naturalization Examiner V. W. Tomlinson, after he was advised that scores of women in these classes had attempted to register. The earliest date upon which any such Oregon woman can benefit under the new law is January 18, 1923. Tomlinson said, as the law provides that all names be posted in a public place for 90 days before the petitions are heard.
By an act of congress, approved September 22, it is provided that after the passage of that act the marriage of an alien woman to an American citizen, or to an alien who may thereafter become a citizen, shall not confer American citizenship upon her. It is also provided that a married woman who is otherwise eligible shall have the privilege of becoming naturalized on her own account, without waiting for her husband to act. Citizenship acquired by women through their husbands by virtue of law in force prior to the passage of the new act, is not affected by the new law.
