**33 States Will Elect Senators On November 7**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—In 33 states, United States senators will be chosen on November 7. The democrats hope to win in a number of them, and thereby reduce materially the republican majority in the senate, although the republicans are equally confident that they will be able to capture several seats now held by democrats and retain their control of the upper chamber of congress by a substantial margin.

The so-called progressives hope for addition to the little group of republican senators, led by Borah of Idaho and La Follette of Wisconsin, which will strengthen them as a “fighting unit” and weaken the ranks of the “Old Guard.”

The democrats have two women candidates for the senate—one in Wisconsin and the other in Minnesota, but neither is considered likely to win.

With the Maine senatorial election already settled by the victory of the republican, Senator Hale, the death of Senator “Tom” Watson, of Georgia, unexpectedly provided another senatorial seat to be filled, with a renewal of factional strife among the democrats of the state.

**FARM REMINDERS**

Many timely hints for home and orchard uses are given in the latest reports from the Oregon agricultural experiment station at Corvallis.

**Bordeaux Mixture Good**

Bordeaux mixture is the best winter spray for fungus diseases on account of its great adhesive and lasting qualities when rightly made. Directions can be secured by writing to the experiment station, Corvallis.

**Remove Garden Refuse**

At the end of the growing season, all plant remains should be carefully removed from the gardens, since many plant diseases and insect pests may be perpetuated through the winter in old refuse, and attack the new plants in the spring.

**Clean Up Orchard in Fall**

In orchards where brown rot has been prevalent, much benefit may be derived by removing the rotted fruits from the ground as well as from the trees. Some growers turn hogs in to clean up the old prunes, while others think it pays best to rake up the rotted prunes and destroy them. It allowed to remain on the ground, they eventually produce spores that perpetuate the disease.

**Rotate Land for Strawberries**

Serious strawberry root infesting insects make it inadvisable to grow strawberries more than two full crop years on the same land. Plow the fields in the fall subsequent to harvesting the second crop of strawberries and use the land in a rotation for crops other than strawberries for at least a three year period.

Work was started at the 2530 foot level and continued to the 2570 foot level.

For the past several days an immense volume of water has been sent down the shaft in an effort to check the flames before they reached the bulkhead.
