Relief Corps and other similar patriotic societies, but owing to the fact that the organization is much younger than the other societies, it has not made itself felt as have the older ones.

Miss Lang dwelt in particular on the Americanization of foreigners and the treatment which they receive on first arriving on this country, and asked that every effort possible be made to entice the new arrivals in the United States with patriotism for the country instead of only having a desire for the dollars which they can earn here.

Another point made was that every American citizen should boost the United States instead of giving it a kick at every chance as many people do, and in addition endeavor to see that the laws of the country, when once on the statute books, are enforced, and thereby giving the children of today a lesson in law and order. She also pointed out the fact that the first place to learn obedience should be in the home, and that once learned there, the children would have more respect for the laws of the land when they became men and women.

In closing her talk, Miss Lang urged that the local organization form a study class on the constitution of the United States, and endeavor to learn more about that great document which gave life to the government of our country.
