National Fruit Cleaning Machine-

The National Fruit Cleaning company is putting on the market, a late model fruit cleaning machine, which cleans the apple of spray and dirt but does not bruise it, as has been demonstrated from last year's crop. There were 20 machines used in Hood River valley during the packing season last year and proved very satisfactory, even though they are of the old model. A small amount of fruit is still in some of the ware houses in perfect condition for so long a time, thereby proving to the most skeptical that it does not bruise the fruit or remove the wax or parafine so necessary to the proper keeping of the apple or other fruit. The fruit is carried by a padded belt between three adjustable spiral brushes revolving in opposite directions. causing the fruit to rotate rapidly while being carried along and brushed. 
