Short Circuit Hard on Lights—

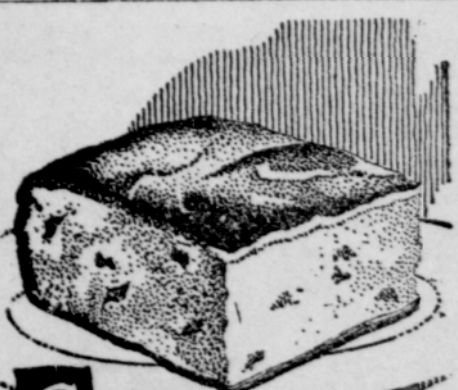

New York City Found Mecca Of Most Swindlers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—It has often been asserted that when the sharpers and swindlers want to do business on a large scale they flock to New York City and find more "easy marks," "good things," and "come ons" than they can find in any other section of the country. No doubt that is true, for New York is the center of the most populous region of the United States. No statistics have been prepared on the subject, but the best information at hand shows that the crop of "suckers" average about the same all over the country. The vender of fake stocks seems to find victims everywhere in proportion to the population.

Commenting on this subject, Lew Wallace Jr., director of the government savings system, says that the gambling spirit among the people, the desire of the average American to "take a chance," is responsible for the success of the fakers, swindlers and sharpers who are taking money away from the people. "Here is where the government steps in and does a great work," said the director. "It offers the people a high class investment in the treasury savings certificates, a security that is within the reach of all, and at the same time it is carrying on an educational campaign to tell the people to avoid the swindlers. Speaking of New York as the best field of the sharpers, I am reminded that only recently, right here in the national capital, under the shadow of the Washington monument, as it were, the business men found it expedient to organize to protect the people against fake stock selling concerns. Bankers, merchants and professional men, as well as the more humble citizens are being caught by the shrewd operators. It was estimated that 100 concerns were selling worthless stock and other fake securities in the city of Washington. It is amazing that these swindlers can succeed in the face of all the warnings which have been given the public against such persons."

LILA LEE'S SPAGHETTI

WHEN not at work in the Paramount motion picture studio at Hollywood Lila Lee enjoys cooking for herself and her mother. Here is one of her favorite recipes for spaghetti. For four persons: Take half a pound of spaghetti. Place in boiling water without breaking. Salt to taste and allow to boil for twenty minutes. Pour off the boiling water and wash the spaghetti in cold water. For the sauce take one can of tomatoes, quarter of a pound of Parmesan cheese (grated), one kernel of garlic, two green peppers, one tablespoon of butter, pepper and salt to taste. Allow the sauce to cook until it becomes boiling hot and serve over spaghetti.

TOO PRONE TO EXAGGERATE

Many Figures of Speech Employed in Ordinary Conversation Are Ridiculous When Analyzed.

A judge in the courts the other day objected to a witness who was prone to use exaggeration and employ figures of speech. The judge remarked that it was absurd to say that "the accused was beside himself with rage" and that "he flew at the other man." He wasn't two people and he hadn't got wings.

The fact is that we are ever looking for something out of the ordinary. When halibut fished during June, they were in a few cases the size of eggs but everybody told everybody else that all of them were as big as footballs.

It's time that we went back to simple description. No day is ever so hot as to be "baking," or we should all be dead. No man drinks "like a fish."

CALLS FOR SOME DISCRETION

Power of Attracting Birds May Be All Right in the Country, but in the City!

One of the best ways of attracting birds, according to the authorities, is to place the lips to the back of the hand and make a violent kissing sound.

Medicine Men.

In all times some degree of healing power has been ascribed to the priesthood.
