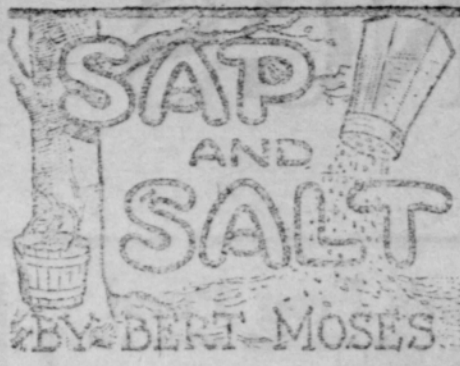

ASHLAND-KLAMATH BOND MEASURE The proposed bond issue for one hundred thousand dollars to raise funds with which to complete the Ashland-Klamath Falls Green Springs road, which will be on the ballot at the November 7th election, is of vast importance to the people of Ashland.

The Ashland-Klamath Falls road is the main artery over the mountain passes between the Rogue river valley and the rich plateaus of Klamath and Lake counties. The two sections are so different in climate and productions that, happily, the produce of one section is in heavy demand by the people of the other.

THE SCHOOL TAX In the Tidings Tuesday there is a story pertaining to the cost of operating the city schools. The headline states, "\$9000 monthly is expended to run Ashland schools."

The Tidings has unjustly been accused of opposing the school tax. This is not so. The Tidings is in favor of any move or expenditure that will result in the ultimate benefit of Ashland.

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Heretofore, the two sections have been hardly accessible to each other. It has proven quicker, better and cheaper for the Klamath Falls county to get its fruit supplies from California, and likewise better for

us to get what we need and do not raise, from California points. We had no direct route between the two sections. Truck freight transportation is proving as rapid, safe and as cheap as rail hauls, under the conditions of safe, easy highway construction.

The grading on the Klamath Falls road is practically completed, and it is awaiting the application of a solid top of its even base and easy grades. This bond issue will supply the funds to properly surface it so that it may become a practical avenue of profitable transportation between these heretofore isolated sections.

It is problematical whether voters down the valley will appreciate the great benefit such a highway will be to them to the extent as to bring out a heavy vote in favor of the measure, but, in this end of the county, there can be no gainsaying the great value of such a road. Therefore, the Ashland district vote should be so unanimous as to overcome any dereliction of interest that may hamper its passage from down the valley.

LOOMIS PLATFORM Being a candidate for mayor of Ashland, I make the following statement of the policies I stand for, and the position I take on the issues of the campaign: The first consideration of a city should be the health of its people, I am, therefore, in favor of taking every precaution to protect the water of Ashland creek from pollution. It must be kept pure.

I believe in the enforcement of the laws, particularly those against gambling and bootlegging. I am opposed to factions in Ashland, and promise, if elected, to be the mayor for all the people, rather than for a part of them. My slogan is this: "The way to get action is to unite every faction."

I am in favor of the new hotel project. We have the scenery, the climate, the soil and the people—everything here except a modern hotel to attract newcomers. Let's get that hotel! I am proud of Ashland's fine reputation everywhere in the matter of schools and education, and I favor any suitable action looking towards the re-opening of the normal school.

I am in favor of having all offices and all positions on the city's payroll filled by citizens and taxpayers of Ashland itself. No outside place-holders! I believe that when the people vote in favor of anything they should get it, and I am opposed to all forms of trickery, particularly the so-called "jokers" that are often used to deceive the voters. I believe that being on the level is the highest form of American citizenship.

The present water supply for Ashland is inadequate, and I favor taking immediate steps toward increasing the supply through such measures as the people may adopt.

I believe the mayor and city council should give their moral influence and support to all practical projects for profitably utilizing the fruits and vegetables of this community. At present, thousands of dollars worth of local products go to waste for lack of canning and preserving facilities. On these principles I ask to be judged. (Signed) CHARLES L. LOOMIS. —adv-tf

League of Nations Can Never Be World Cop Is Declaration of Peer of England

LONDON, Oct. 26.—The league of nations can never be the policeman of the world.

Sir Sidney Low, noted British publicist and professor, gives this warning to those league advocates who are launching schemes for a world-army under control of the league of nations to punish naughty nations and vigorously spank the nations that are refractory.

Lord Robert Cecil, at Geneva, proposed that the league should have an aerial police force, and indicated that he was beginning to doubt whether the league could ever act effectively unless it possesses military power—the very evil which it was formed to combat.

All this may happen in Utopia or "Cuckoo-land," says Sir Sidney Low. It will never happen on the old sphere that is now whirling through space.

"War is the result of policy," says Sir Sidney, "and there is no nation which will submit to have its policy arranged for it by an international council of officials and professors and 'experts,' over which it has no effective control."

"No conventions or covenants will induce an independent nation to make war against its interests, sentiments and inclinations."

"The league might call its spirits from the vasty deep; but they would not come unless it suited them. 'No; the league of nations is not going to police the globe, or be permitted to call upon the nations to make war in order to stop war."

It will continue to be a talking shop, a dignified debating society for the discussion of international conduct.

"As such it may perform quite useful and honorable functions, somewhat resembling those of the British Association for the Advancement of Science. But the British association does not have a palace and a whole hierarchy of extravagantly paid officials, and a secretary who receives more in salary and allowances than any prime minister."

The league means well and may eventually do something, but it is distinctly dear at the price."
