Orphans and the Sick Now Have Priority In American Feeding Plans for Russia; Food Remittances Hope of Thousands



The motherless girls in the picture above were photographed as they took their daily walk along the Strassnoi Boulevard, Moscow. Green summer did not bring them much happiness, and only two of the group could muster smiles.

Children such as these will have right-of-way with what remains of the millions made available for Russian relief through the charity of the American people. The feeding of 10,500,000 persons a day throughout the famine crisis drained severely

the resources of the American Relief Administration, but Herbert Hoover, Chairman of the organization, has approved a program of daily meals throughout the winter for 1,300,000 children.

The fate of countless teachers, doctors, nurses, and other professional people depends on the extent of sympathy which Americans, forgetting political differences and arguments as to blame, feel toward those who must suffer the bitter aftermaths of famine.

Colonel William N. Haskell, director of the A. R. A. in Russia,

has estimated that, despite the harvest now coming in, more than 1,000,000 hangover adult sufferers present a mute but appealing case to the continued generosity of the United States.

There is one certain way to send direct aid, to the recipients, pitifully welcome aid. The A. R. A. is continuing its Food Remittance system past the actual famine emergency and money sent to American headquarters, 42 Broadway, will be transferred in the form of food either to general relief or to any designated person, or group.

HUGE RAILROAD MERGER PLEADED BEFORE I. C. C.

PORTLAND, Oct. 31.—Consolidation of the Northern Pacific, the Great Northern, the Burlington and the S. P. & Q. S. into one system, will be urged before the interstate commerce commission on November 17, instead of the tentative groupings proposed by the commission.

This will make two major northern lines competing systems, Charles Donnelly, president of the Northern Pacific, stated on his arrival here.

ROME, Oct. 31.—An announcement from the foreign office says that the new premier, Mussolini, would recall at once Signor Roland Ricci, Italian ambassador to America. He has been in Italy on a vacation for the past six months.

Eight are reported killed and several wounded in a clash between the fascisti and communists. Sixty thousand fascisti are marching, shouting "Long live the king!"

The new cabinet has been sworn in and are now functioning.

G. O. P. ADMINISTRATION LAUDED BY SECY. DAVIS

PORTLAND, Oct. 31.—Labor is better satisfied, unemployment lower and the minimum of wages more satisfactory in the United States now than at any time before the war, as a result of the first two years of the republican administration, Secretary of Labor Davis said today. Employers are bidding for men and mechanics are scarce.

MAKE THEIR OWN WEATHER

Screen Directors Have at Their Command Appliances Which Equal Any Methods of Nature.

On the cinema screen, even in a very short play, frequent weather changes—rain, fog and wind, are often depicted. If artists and photographers waited for real weather such as they required to occur, a lot of valuable time would be wasted. The simplest solution is to make your own weather, so that you can turn on just the type you want. Three appliances are used. The first is the rainmaker, which looks like a lightly made fire-engine. It is provided with a lattice-work tower on the top of which stands an operator who, by opening or closing taps, can produce either fine or heavy rain. The rain is directed toward the air current made by the wind machine, and by varying the strength of the "wind," the "rain" can be made to fall gently or in wild driving squalls. The wind-maker is nothing more than an engine with a large propeller mounted on a motor lorry. By regulating the speed you can have a gentle breeze that will just ruffle the heroine's curls, or a hurricane which tears leaves and branches off the trees and buffets the players as severely as a real storm. The fog machine, also mounted on a lorry, contains a number of metal nozzles provided with regulating valves. Through them a harmless white gas is liberated in such quantities as may be necessary.

GOT IDEA FROM "PITCHMEN"

Humble Beginning of Career of Man Who Founded One of Greatest Department Stores.

The vendors of small articles sold on the street after a "spiel" and demonstration are known as "pitchmen." According to an article in a recent number of a popular weekly, this industry was begun in 1869 in New York city. A newsboy by the name of Stovers got hold of some knives that had become slightly rusty, at a bargain price and sold them for a quarter, making 200 per cent profit for himself. He saw an opportunity to duplicate his feat by getting more knives, which he did, but soon the available stock was exhausted.

He associated a partner with himself, and sold lead pencils in the same way. The partner's name was "Dutchy" Lehman. In a short time profits of \$6,000 had accumulated. Lehman considered their luck a temporary thing, and took his share of the profits, \$3,000, to Chicago, and with it opened a miniature department store, using similar tactics as the "pitchmen" by displaying goods on open tables. Immediate and increasing success crowned his efforts, and the business expanded into what is now one of the largest department stores in the world.
