Newman Defines His Position on Judgship

MEDFORD, Oregon, November 2, 1922.

To the Public: Some time ago I signed an article indorsing the candidacy of E. E. Kelly as circuit judge for this district, with the distinct understanding at that time between myself and the gentlemen who presented the article to me for my signature, that I reserved the right to also endorse the candidacy of C. M. THOMAS, should he seek the indorsement of the Bar of the two counties. At that time I stated to those presenting the Kelly indorsement my reasons for signing same, which reasons seemed to meet with their entire approval, viz: that I had known Kelly for the past twenty-five years, served with him in the same regiment during the Spanish-American War, and the Philippine Insurrection, and that I personally hold him in the highest esteem as a man and a soldier. That I believed that if should be elected to the high, honorable and most intensely responsible position of circuit judge, that he would do his best to fill the position with credit to himself and to the public, and stated to them at the time that I believed that C. M. Thomas, if elected, would do likewise.

The indorsement which I signed has now been published and sent broadcast throughout the two counties, and over the State of Oregon, in connection with the indorsement by Judge Calkins of the same candidate, and coupled with an article of a political nature, the origin of which I know not, and I deem it my duty at this time to explain my position in this whole matter, and to state frankly just where I stand on this question of the judgship. I owe this duty, not only to myself, but to C. M. Thomas, and to my many friends and acquaintances throughout the two counties with whom I have heretofore discussed the matter, and to whom I have endeavored to give a fair, unprejudiced and entirely unpartisan opinion as to the QUALIFICATIONS of the two candidates for circuit judge.

The article signed by myself and other attorneys, as published, is coupled with a false and misleading statement leading the public to understand that the signers to the indorsement constitute a majority of the practicing lawyers of Jackson and Josephine counties, and indicating that such MAJORITY IS OPPOSED TO THE CANDIDACY OF C. M. THOMAS. I wish the PUBLIC to understand that I RESENT SUCH INFERENCE, and the use of the article in question IN THE MANNER SAME HAS BEEN USED, and that I personally deplore the actions of a small number of the PRACTICING AND RETIRED ATTORNEYS of this county in seeking to make the office of Circuit Judge a POLITICAL FOOTBALL. I deplore the use, in connection with such office, of an appeal to the PREJUDICE and HATRED incident to the recent recall election, Ku Klux Klan excitement, and several issues now before the electorate of the state for determination at the next election. I most sincerely regret the attitude of MY FRIEND KELLY in this connection.

I can not and will not support any candidate for the office of Circuit Judge who will go out and occupy the same platform with speakers (mostly LAWYERS) who will resort to an appeal to the prejudice of the electorate on issues ENTIRELY FOREIGN TO and in no manner connected with the NON-PARTISAN and ESSENTIALLY NON-PREJUDICIAL position of CIRCUIT JUDGE. Neither can I endorse the attitude of these would-be "guide posts to the electorate" who are going about the DISTRICT nightly, daily and all the time, with a band of trained MUSICIANS in an EFFORT TO DRAW A CROWD TO LISTEN TO THEIR ARGUMENTS. If the speakers need to resort to such tactics to gain an AUDIENCE THE SUBJECT OF THEIR DISCOURSE must be of SMALL IMPORTANCE to the ELECTORATE. Or do they deem the electorate more interested in GOOD MUSIC than in POOR ARGUMENT upon the IMPORTANT ISSUES they seek to present FAIRLY and IMPARTIALLY to the UNSUSPECTING VOTER, to whom they ATTEMPT TO DICTATE THE MARKING OF HIS BALLOT? IN THE NAME OF PATRIOTISM AND FAIR PLAY, KELLY, "Charge Bayonets" on these practices, or be prepared to "SOUND TAPS" on your aspirations to be the next Circuit Judge of this Judicial District. Cut loose from this band of traveling minstrels and submit your candidacy to the voters upon YOUR OWN PERSONAL QUALIFICATIONS to fill the important position to which you aspire.

Let the electorate of this district choose between E. E. KELLY and C. M. THOMAS upon the REAL AND ONLY ISSUE involved, viz: THE RESPECTIVE QUALIFICATIONS of each thereof to fill the important position of CIRCUIT JUDGE of this DISTRICT for the next SIX YEARS, unbiased and unprejudiced by the mud slinging campaign now being conducted by this conglomeration of Elephant and Mule styling itself THE INDEPENDENT AMERICAN VOTERS LEAGUE.
