LET IT STRAIGHT

It is exceedingly important, in the city election tomorrow that voters for Mr. Loomis vote the whole ticket straight. The campaign has been a hot one and party spirit has been aroused to a high pitch. Should Mr. Loomis be elected and a majority of the councilmen on the opposite ticket as well, little will be accomplished in the next two years. If you want a change, vote for a complete change, without regard to personal friendships. There is a principle involved in this election. There are a great number of citizens who believe that the influences heretofore dominating the public activities of the city should be swept away clean. There are some good men on the Blake ticket. Were there no principle involved and the issues were purely between individuals, the writer would vote for some of the Blake councilmanic candidates, but the issues are too important. Not only do we need a change, but we need a complete change, a change so complete that when Charlie Loomis takes the place, he will have the support of a complete council and not be hampered in his work by the influences outside of the council which have been directing the town in the past.

Let's vote it straight. This is not said alone for the Loomis ticket. If you are for the Blake ticket, vote that straight. Fix it so that those who are elected will understand they represent a majority sentiment in the town. Then they can act without friction and go forward without discord to carry out the principles in city administration they stand for.

Vote it straight tomorrow on the city ticket. Lay personal likes and dislikes aside and vote for the principle, either of a complete change, or vote it straight to leave the city completely under the influences which have in the past and will continue to dominate if the Blake ticket gets a majority.

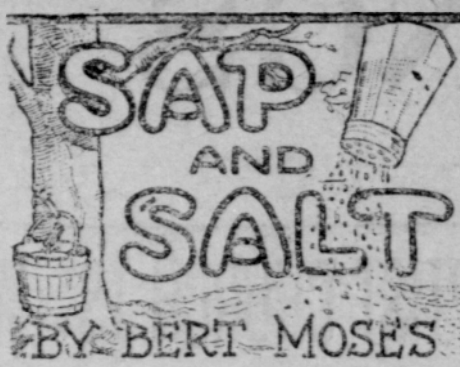
Vote the city ticket straight, one way or the other.

lately free from contamination.

THE PEOPLE'S FORUM.

To the editor:
Coming down from Portland to Ashland yesterday, I chanced to meet on the train a very prominent Oregon business man. We fell to talking about what a wonderful state we have, and yet we are unable to get more people to come here. I asked him why Washington on the north and California on the south had so far outstripped us, and he replied:
"Three words tell the story: Town Pump Politics. We have the same deplorable conditions in Portland that you have in Ashland. New-comers are looked upon with suspicion. They are not welcomed here as they are in our neighboring states. We are narrow-minded and jealous. We are under the domination of selfish cliques, or rather diasties, as your local editor calls them. They permit no new idea to be adopted and no new enterprises to be undertaken unless they can control it and grab off their own piece of change. They put their own interests ahead of the public's interests, and naturally the new-comers with their new capital, pass us up. That is why Oregon has but eight people to the square mile, while both Washington and California have over 20.
"That is also why Oregon's taxes are so high. We pile up big expenses on the back of a small population. Our only salvation is to put new men into office; men who extend the hand of fellowship instead of the fishy eye and the frigid mitt. When we get more people here the taxes will be spread out thinner. What Oregon needs is a complete change of government all around. Until we get it our scenic wonders and our natural resources will continue to remain almost unknown to the rest of the country." I feel as this man feels. Ashland is in a rut. Nothing will do it more good than a change in our local government. We need new men and women and new ideas to jar us loose from our Rip Van Winkle lethargy. Tomorrow a chance will be given the voters to make the necessary changes and to put Ashland in the hands of safe, progressive, cheerful officials. It is time our beautiful city came to the front, and it is time for Ashland to get some real

benefit from the bounties and benefactions Nature has bestowed upon us.

Let's try a change. We will never get anywhere as things stand now, and as they will continue to stand under present influences.

You are more or less familiar with my activities in Ashland. What I have done for the city is evidence, I hope, of the love I have for it and its people. My treatment here by an overwhelming majority of the citizens have been friendly, kindly and generous. The only opposition I have encountered comes from what the Tidings calls the "invisible government." It has systematically and continuously antagonized my every move to make Ashland a more beautiful and more healthful place in which to live.

As an instance, I was stubbornly opposed when I tried, at my own expense, to place sanitary toilets along the Ashland creek canyon to protect our water supply from pollution by picnickers and hikers. I believe the mayor and city council should give their moral influence and support to all practical

projects for profitably utilizing the fruits and vegetables of this community. At present, thousands of dollars worth of local products go to waste for lack of canning and preserving facilities.
On these principles I ask to be judged.
