THE LEGISLATURE SCRAMBLE

(Editorial Thursday's Medford Mail Tribune)

There are two energetic factions concentrating upon the election of Ralph Cowgill and Miss Hanley to the state legislature, while John Carkin is in danger of being lost in the shuffle.

This is altogether unfortunate. John Carkin is better qualified than any other candidate for the state legislature. He served a former term, most creditably. He is level headed, public spirited, efficient and industrious. It would be a genuine loss, not to Carkin himself, for there is neither profit nor any particular honor in the office he seeks, but to Jackson county, if he should be defeated.

In this wild political riot now in progress, The Mail Tribune urges all citizens to keep their hats on straight, as far as that is possible. What we want at Salem is a harmonious and efficient delegation, free from fanaticism on either side, competent to serve the best interests of their state and their district.

Carkin with his former experience and familiarity with the legislative ropes, is admirably fitted to lead such a delegation. He should be elected. It will be Jackson county's loss if he is not.

LOCAL MAN PRAISED BY THE OREGON VOTER

John H. Carkin of Medford was a member of the 1913 legislature and is a candidate for the 1923 legislature in Jackson county. He made a fine record in 1913, and in addition exercised a great deal of influence on legislation. He was one of the live wires of the session, on the floor and in committee.
