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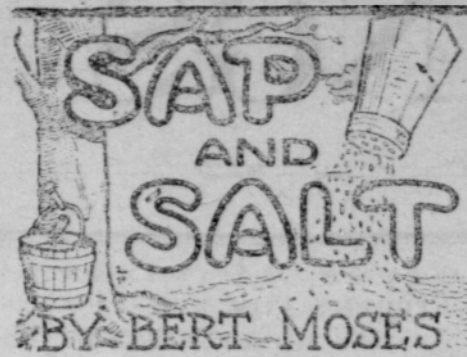
AMERICA'S MOTHER

One of the greatest mothers the nation has ever known is the American Red Cross. No mother ever nursed her child with more tenderness or care than have members of this organization in their care of distressed, sick and helpless individuals.

During the war of 1917-18, the Red Cross soared to the heights of its work, until in the minds of many people, it was believed the care of wounded and sick soldiers and sailors was the main function of the organization. Carried away by the stress and excitement of the times, the Red Cross was foremost in the minds of the general public.

Years before the war, the Red Cross came into existence, and ever since those tempestuous times it has been active in reconstruction work that followed. Many returned service men found themselves without jobs; work was scarce and families were depending upon these men for sustenance. It was to this class of humanity that the Red Cross then devoted its energies. Countless thousands were temporarily tided over a financial crisis. Many were found positions that enabled them to feed the hungry mouths at home. Publicity may have ceased, but the work never.

Disasters that are fresh in the memory of the present generation, such as the San Francisco earthquake, various floods and fires, the wonderful work carried on by the organization among the Armenian refugees, work in famine and plague stricken areas in other portions of the globe, railroad wrecks, forest fires, where hundreds were made homeless, the Argonaut mine disaster near Jackson, California, and so on down an almost endless list.
