One million members of forty different nationalities all wearing the white ribbon bow, the emblem of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, this is the organization which will hold its eleventh world-wide convention at Philadelphia, November 11-16, in the Academy of Music. World W. C. T. U. workers from Burma, Korea, China, Japan, Ceylon, Turkey, Palestine, Egypt, Iceland, Canada, Belgium, Germany, France, Greece, Switzerland, Italy, and many other countries, will report on the work now being carried on and the progress of the prohibition and temperance movements in their respective countries. Something of the distinction and importance of the work of the World's W. C. T. U. is indicated by the noted woman who has served as presidents of the organization. Margaret Bright Lucas, the first president, was the sister of John Bright, England's renowned premier. The second was Frances E. Willard, who was succeeded by Lady Henry Somerset and by Rosalind, countess of Carlisle. Miss Anna A. Gordon of Evanston, president of the National and vice president of the World's W. C. T. U., has been acting president since the death of the countess of Carlisle in the summer of 1921. Miss Gordon will preside at the convention and will also give an account of her recent trip to Mexico in the interests of the prohibition movement. There she learned that the anti-alcohol movement is not confined to the missionary interests, but that President Obregon and other government officials, as well as leading senators and educational authorities, are preparing to take definite steps to rid Mexico of the liquor traffic. It is expected that a measure aimed to do away with the pulque industry will be introduced in congress within a few months. The other general officers of the World's W. C. T. U. are Miss Agnes E. Slack of England and Mrs. Blanche Johnston of Canada, honorary secretaries, and Mrs. Ella A. Boole of Brooklyn, N. Y., honorary treasurer. One of the striking features of the convention will be the exhibition of the Polyglot petition, written by Frances E. Willard about a year after the formation of the organization and circulated in many countries over the globe. The total number of signatures so far aggregate seven and one-half million. Some are in Chinese characters, Burmese, Kanaka, Spanish, English—in fact nearly every tongue is represented. The World's W. C. T. U. has held ten conventions, four in the United States, one in Canada, two in England, two in Scotland, and one in Geneva, Switzerland. The National W. C. T. U. convention will be held following the world's meeting, in Philadelphia, November 13-19.



Some of the delegates to the eleventh convention of the World's Woman's Christian Temperance Union, to be held in Philadelphia November 11-16, will circumnavigate the globe in their journey to take part in their first convention ever held on "dry" land. Delegates from 40 nations will attend this world rally which will take place in the Academy of Music. Many delegates are now on their way from Australia, Japan, China, India, Egypt, Turkey, Africa, England, Scotland, Ireland, Germany, France, Cuba, Mexico, Canada, and several of the South American countries. Mme. Kubushiro, national corresponding secretary of Japan's W. C. T. U., and a niece of Mme. Kaji Yajima, Japan's most famous woman, will come as an official delegate. She will represent her organization which owns its own headquarters at Tokyo, and has a membership of more than 5,000. Miss Uta Hayashi from Osaka, decorated by the emperor for her work among women, will accompany Mme. Kubushiro. Miss Marie Stenroth, an author of national repute, will represent her government which has commissioned her to study prohibition and the problems involved in its enforcement and make a report. The Baroness de Laveleye, president of Belgium's W. C. T. U., will be the official delegate of her country. Miss Dagmar Prior will represent Norway and Denmark. From Edinburgh comes Miss Jane Darling, proprietor of the Darling Regal hotel, known the world over. It has been in the family many years and has always been conducted on temperance lines. Miss Consuelo Valdez is the delegate from the Philippine Islands. She is a graduate of the School of Pharmacy, University of the Philippines, and is now taking special courses at Northwestern university, Chicago. Frauella Wilhelmina Lohmann is one of the German delegates. She was the moving spirit of the recent semi-official vote, the first prohibition vote ever taken in Germany, where at Bielefeld, the unexpected number of 12,821 votes was returned for prohibition out of a poll of 14,061. Frauella Gustel von Blucher, the great grand niece of the famous field marshal, will also attend the World convention as a delegate.

Re-Proofing Your Raincoat.

Whatever the time of year, one needs a reliable raincoat in the country, but unless of a rubberized variety, many raincoats quickly lose their rain-proof qualities, and are useless for the purpose they were intended to fill. Here is a method of re-waterproofing cloth that will be found quite successful and easily carried out at home. Take one and a quarter pounds of alum and dissolve this in five gallons of boiling water. In another bath dissolve one and a quarter pounds of sugar of lead. Then mix the two solutions. Place the coat in the mixture and make sure that it is saturated with the liquor. Without wringing, put the coat in a hanger and dry, plunge into cold water and then hang out to dry again. This time it will be fit for use, and will withstand ordinary rain.

Greatest Mother Summons Her Children



An allegorical concept of the Red Cross as a peace-time ideal is employed by the American Red Cross in a new and striking poster for its Annual Red Cross Roll Call. Spread out before the heroic size figure is the outline of the United States with a Red Cross superimposed upon it while around its borders are sketched scenes depicting the chief activities of the Red Cross today—service to disabled veterans of the World War, disaster relief and promotion of the public health. The poster is the work of Lawrence Wilbur, a New York artist, and will be displayed throughout the country during the enrollment of the Red Cross membership for 1923, which begins Armistice Day, Nov. 11, and extends to Thanksgiving, Nov. 30.
