ANKLE SKIRTS, SAYS PARIS; "NIX," IS POTTSTOWN REPLY



GIRLS of Pottstown, Pa., have formed an alliance to defend the knee-length skirt. "Paris designers may insist that those trailing things must be worn, but we are going to continue to wear 'em short," is the ultimatum of the Pottstown "home" rulers. "Pottstown is not Paris." Undoubtedly true! So the battle is joined, Pottstown on one extreme, Paris on the other. The question of just how long the skirts are to be has started plenty of skirmishing throughout the country. The clash of conflicting opinions may be heard from Maine to California. Designers and dressmakers occupy an unenviable position at the center of the conflict. Manufacturers, however, have seen the handwriting on the wall. They say the skirts are going to be longer—about eight inches from the ground—and are basing their production on this belief. They say that the average American woman is not an extremist. A great many things depend on skirt length, you see. Low heeled shoes and woolen stockings are not "dressy," while long skirts are "dressy." They do not harmonize. In addition, low heeled shoes taken in conjunction with long skirts make the feet look large, and woolen stockings, for protective purposes, are hardly necessary. Goloshes cannot be seen in company with long skirts, being also disturbers of "dressiness." Bloomers are well enough—indeed, almost necessary—with knee-length dresses, but with those reaching to the ankles, or even half way to the ankles, petticoats are equally necessary. They provide a foundation for the proper "hang," and provide also opaqueness. So skirts—mere skirts—are revolutionizing industries, and the wheels of production are being turned from woolen to silk and mercerized stockings from low to high heeled shoes, from goloshes to Russian boots, from bloomers to petticoats.

It is far more profitable to feed a safe mash that will produce a good average egg yield throughout the year and maintain the birds in health and vigor so that they may be kept at a profit for two or three years than to use a feed that produces an erratic production and undermines the health of the fowls, rendering them unprofitable for more than one season. It is difficult and expensive to produce so many new pullets every year. These are mighty important points.
