Movements of Fishes. Remarkable investigations into the habits of fish are being carried out by the British ministry of fisheries. The object is to discover how far and in what direction fish travel; whether there are seasons in which organized migrations take place; and how fast various kinds of fish grow.

"Adamzad." The Chemosit, or Nandi bear, a mysterious animal that is said to haunt the deep forests in the more inaccessible parts of the East African highlands, has again been seen, this time by a party of reliable European and native witnesses.

It has been seen by various people several times during recent years, but no specimen has been killed or captured. The latest description of the bear tallies accurately with previous reports. The animal is between five and six feet high, walks on his hind legs something after the manner of a chimpanzee, and has a long fringe of white hair completely encircling its face.—Milwaukee Sentinel.

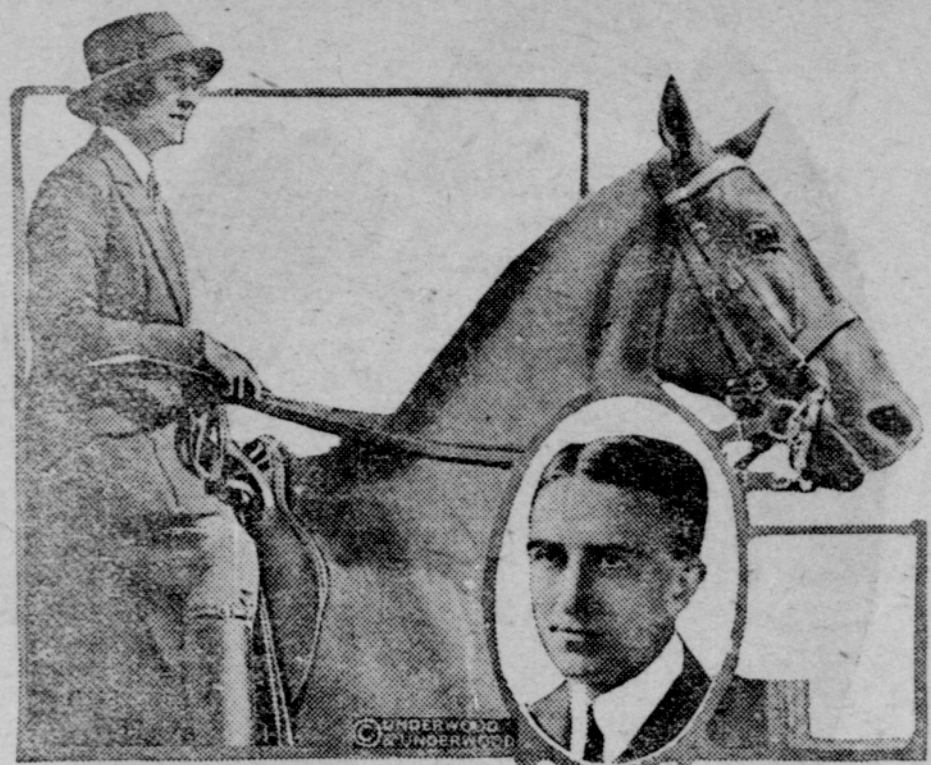

torn down and the lot completely cleaned up.

A communication received from the Free Methodist church was read, asking if the city would take \$60 as full payment for the amount due on the paving contract, which amounts to about \$90. It was decided that the penalties should be remitted, and up to \$20 of the principal, with certain limitations.

Another communication was received during the evening, it being from the newly elected mayor, and five of the newly elected members of the council, and was worded as follows:

"Ashland, Oregon, November 21, 1922. To the honorable mayor and council, Gentlemen:

"We, the undersigned, mayor-elect, councilmen-elect and councilwoman-elect for the city of Ashland, Oregon, are reliably informed that your body is thinking seriously of, or about to enter into a contract with the Talent irrigation district for the purchase of water from them to irrigate 400 acres of land in the city of Ashland, the same to be used on that part of the city east of Ashland creek and distributed to the users in a system of open ditches.

"We take this opportunity of informing your body that we are unalterably opposed to this contract,

notwithstanding any conclusion you may have reached by our attitude at your meeting the evening of November 17, at which time we were without full knowledge of the situation.

"We are opposed to the making of this contract; first, because we do not believe that, rightly construed, the city charter gives the council the power to make a contract of this magnitude without a vote of the people; second, we do not believe that the health of the city will be advanced or conserved by this system of open ditches; third, that since

we are going to have to assume the responsibility of whatever water project is undertaken, that we should take up our duties in this work unhampered by or without any promises whatsoever to the present city council.

"C. L. Loomis, S. A. Peters Sr., M. C. Linsinger, H. C. Wolcott, R. L. Burdick Jr., Mrs. M. M. Barber."

The council formed themselves into a canvassing board during the evening and looked over the ballots as turned in and found the original returns to be correct.
