WASHINGTON Nov. 24 .- The department of justice has ordered federal district attorneys to institute suits against contractors who built the country's war cantonments. At-

Although it is admitted the government was gouged much more, it cannot be recovered due to lack of evidence. Hearings will begin within a few days all over the country, and are said to be the beginning of a complete exposure of "war price gouging" in every field of endeavor. Padding of labor costs, materials and the like are charged.

Eighteen separate federal court actions will be instituted. There are said to be included a number of men who rushed to the aid of their country in the emergency.

Premier Lived Life of Pacifist Prior To 1914, He Declares; Thrown into Prussian Prison Once for His Peace Doctrines.

BOSTON, Nov. 24.—Clemenceau lashed back at the United States senate, Hitchcock and Borah. The "Tiger" declares Hitchcock's speech

He answered Borah's assertion that he (Clemenceau) was responsible for conditions in Europe. The "Tiger" says his position has been distressing, since in France he had been criticized for not asking the Germans for as much as he should have. He says he suffered for 40 years for not being militarist. Once he was thrown into a Prussian prison for his pacifist attitude. He turned militarist when the war broke out.
