



ANTIQUITIES IN WHITE HOUSE

The weather forecast for the week Attractions Well Worth Inspection Are Known to Comparatively Few Visitors in Washington.

> Least advertised of the attractions of the White House is a collection of antiquities relating to the historic mansion, which is on view in a basement

> This oval room, by the way, was used for receiving guests in the old days, when the main door of entrance to the White House was in the middle of the south side and not on the north front, as at present. It is slightly above the ground level, and the oldtime entrance still remains, opening directly upon the spacious lawn. Formerly a road led past it, which in wet weather was so muddy that arriving guests-had trouble to keep their feet

Thus it was in Dolly Madison's day, and one of the most interesting curios in the little museum is her book of Crater Lake highway in the second cooking recipes, blank pages of which approximate cost of \$6,000,000.
