

# MEDFORD CANCELS FOOTBALL GAME

## NOTIFICATION IS SENT ASHLAND THIS AFTERNOON

PRINCIPAL FORSYTHE MAKING AN EFFORT TO SECURE ANOTHER TEAM

### ATHLETIC RELATIONS DECLARED SEVERED

Message Is Brief and to the Point; Protest as to Eligibility of Players Is Believed to be Cause of Calling Off the Game.

Cancellation of the Ashland-Medford high school football game scheduled for Thanksgiving afternoon was made by wire late this afternoon.

No reasons for the calling off of the game were given in the message. Following is the message received by Principal B. F. Forsythe:

"Medford, Oregon, November 29, 1922.

"Principal of the high school, Ashland, Oregon.

"This is to officially notify you that the Medford high school has cancelled the football game scheduled for November 30, and that all athletic relations are broken off for an indefinite period.

(Signed) "Principal Medford high school, Superintendent of city schools."

While it was too late to learn any reasons for the cancellation, it is believed it was done because of a protest made against some of the Medford players following the Armistice day game. It is understood that Nef, in particular, was intelligible, having played with a navy team for some time.

A last minute attempt is being made by local officials to arrange for some other team to play here tomorrow afternoon, instead of Medford.

### WHOLE WORLD IS TOLD OF CIVIC CLUB DEDICATION

Radio station KFAY, of Medford, will broadcast the announcement of the formal opening of the Women's Civic club building, at 10:30 o'clock tonight, according to word received today from W. J. Virgin, operating the station. Following is the news item that will be broadcasted.

"The Women's Civic Improvement club, of Ashland, Oregon, wish to announce the formal opening of their beautiful club house Saturday, December 2, afternoon and evening. This is the first woman's club house built in southern Oregon. There is an auditorium, banquet hall, kitchen, offices, rest rooms, nursery and bath rooms.

"One year ago, the Women's Civic club started this building. Money was raised from entertainments, gifts and a salvage shop. Money came in so slowly that the completion was set for 1920, but last August, Jesse Winburn, of 'Sap and Salt,' formerly of New York City, sent word to the Women's Civic club that he would finish and furnish the club house.

"The building and furnishings are very elaborate and complete in every detail. Too much credit cannot be given Jesse Winburn for this splendid gift, which is one of many that he has bestowed upon the town which is proud to call him one of her citizens.

"The Women's Civic club broadcast is an invitation to the world to be present at the dedication Saturday, and invites you personally to enjoy the hospitality of the club house, and the city's scenic beauties, auto park and mineral springs."

### WHITE HOUSE OBSERVES A QUIET THANKSGIVING

Illness of Mrs. Harding Brings Cancellation of All Formal Functions; President to Spend Day in Sick Room with Wife.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Following a series of conferences with the President Harding, Attorney General Daugherty has instructed all of the United States district attorneys to urge federal judges to render more severe sentences against violators of the national prohibition act.

He will also urge injunctions against building owners whose premises are used for bootlegging or distilling illicit liquors.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Because of Mrs. Harding's illness, the regular White House observance of Thanksgiving will be abandoned. The president will spend the most of the day in the sick room. Mrs. Harding is not able to partake of solid foods or to entertain friends.

The president has received four turkeys, two 'possums and a big pig. White House attaches are optimistic over Mrs. Harding's recovery. The president is denying himself all social engagements.

### ENGLAND CALLS MINISTER HOME FROM ASIA MINOR

DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS WITH GREECE SEVERED BY EXECUTIONS

### DEATH OF WAR LEADERS PROTESTED BY BRITAIN

Terrorists, Betrayers and Traitors Applied to Cabinet by Court Martial; All Are Said to Have Died Bravely.

ATHENS, Nov. 29.—Diplomatic relations between England and Greece were broken off when the British minister left for his home, because of the execution of five former Greek ministers against the wishes of England.

Further executions are expected. The six officials who were shot yesterday, died bravely. A statement from the court martial reads:

"These terrorists and traitors endeavored to strengthen the throne under Constantine in order to enjoy public office. They betrayed the people."

The men condemned to death were: Former Premier Gonaris; former Premier Protopapadakis; former Minister of Interior Stratos; former Minister of War Theotakis; former Foreign Minister Baltazis and General Hadjanestis.

General Stratos and Admiral Gonaris were sentenced to life imprisonment.

All were tried before a general court martial created by the Greek revolutionary commission after the overthrow of Constantine's old government.

### HOTEL PROJECT TAKES SHAPE AT MEETING TODAY

CONSIDER PLANS TO INCORPORATE COMPANY TO COMPLETE PROPOSITION

### DESIRABLE SITES ARE NOW UNDER ADVISEMENT

Options for Location of Building Discussed; Expenditure of \$300,000 Thought Advisable; Ashland People to be Allowed to Buy Stock.

Ashland's hotel project, which has been in the air for many months, finally came to earth today when the hotel committee, composed of seven members of the chamber of commerce, met this morning for the purpose of considering available hotel sites. The organization and incorporation of a hotel company was recommended, and William Briggs, city attorney, agreed to give his services without charge for drawing up articles of incorporation, and will submit these to the state immediately.

The committee further decided to proceed at once toward the acquiring of options on suitable sites for the hotel, several of which are being considered.

With something definite to work on, the much discussed hotel project, involving approximately \$300,000, will be rushed to completion. In as much as the hotel is an Ashland project, a portion of the stock will be placed before residents of the city who may wish to invest in the project, although a large block of the stock will be held by those backing the hotel proposition.

Those who are identified with the project at this time, and who will be financially interested, are Jesse Winburn, H. G. Enders Sr., C. H. Pierce, Bert R. Greer, T. H. Simpson, J. P. Dodge, B. L. Moses, Rev. W. Judson Oldfield, Homer Billings and Sylvester Patterson.

### STREETS BEING MARKED FOR PARKING PURPOSES

The city council some time ago voted to change the parking ordinance of the city so as to require all cars to back to the curb instead of heading in as has been the practice in the past. But when the ordinance came before the mayor, he showed his disapproval of the same by failing to sign it. No action was taken by the council in regard to the matter and several days ago the mayor obtained a painter and ordered him to mark the streets for the heading in of all cars.

However, due to a misunderstanding between the mayor and the painter, quite a number of spaces were marked for cars to back to the curb before the mayor was apprised of the fact that the marks were different from what he ordered. The mayor immediately ordered that the marks be painted out and others be painted in, as ordered, but drivers of cars took to the new idea so readily that before the painter was able to get back on the job, practically every car was backing to the curb whether in the newly painted district or not.

When seen last evening, Mayor Lamkin said that owing to the ease with which the change was made, the painter would be instructed to paint the balance of the streets for parking purposes, so that all cars would back to the curb, except where it was found impracticable.
