Fur Coats Fall Into Three Types



FUR coats can be divided into three distinct types, all fashionable and smart and typical of this year. First, there is the straight cape-coat type that slopes outward gently from shoulder down to the bottom. This type by no means suggests the dolman, as that is hopelessly passe (except for some strictly evening wrap types). The cape-coat is straight and loose in line, with cuffed slits that pass for sleeves. This first type is shown above in the photo of May McAvoy, the Paramount star, who wears it in "Clarence," a new William de Mille production for Paramount. The wrap is of Hudson seal, with collar of German fish. Around the bottom of the coat there are twelve diagonal bands of the seal skins. The second type of coat is shown in the smaller sketch to the right-center. This type follows the suit lines of the season, with the long Russian blouse effect, the long skirt drawn tightly over the hips, bell shaped sleeves, etc. This type is generally made up in caracul or mole skin, collared and cuffed in long shaggy furs. It is very smart, but one not likely to be fashionable a season ahead. Here today and gone tomorrow sort of model. The third type is shown in the sketch to the left. The type is gaining in favor every day. It hugs the upper part of the figure and flares as it nears the bottom. Some of these coats almost finish in a flounce. They are all very graceful, and are ideal over the long full skirts of the mode. This last type is made up in all sorts of fur, notably squirrel, but also in the handsomer furs, ermine, sable and mink.

Rainfall Is Heavy—More rain fell during the recent storm that swept the Rogue River valley in 36 hours than during the entire month of November, according to weather bureau figures. Though the rain was accompanied by a high wind, very little damage has been reported. The heaviest rainfall during the past month was on November 9, when 45 inches fell. Seven days were clear, and 23 cloudy or partly cloudy. The warmest day was November 21, when the mercury reached 65 degrees, and the coldest on November 27, when 21 degrees was recorded. Killing frosts began on November 12 and continued through the remainder of the month.
