Endeavorers Plan Social—

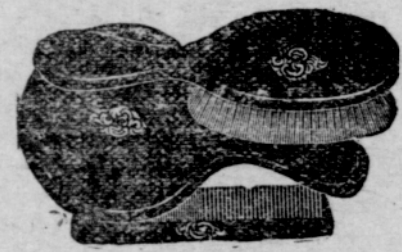

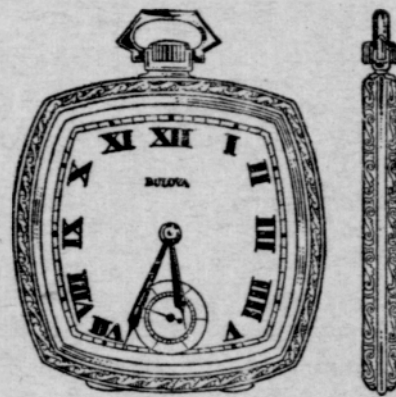

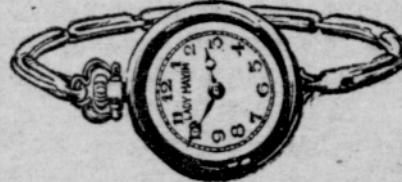
