INTERNATIONAL TENSION OVER LIQUOR RELIEVED

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Diplomatic tension existing over the enforcement of the American prohibition laws against foreign ships was considerably relieved today, when the State and Treasury departments advised that

practically all foreign ship lines have decided to stop loading beverage liquor under seal for homeward voyage.

British and French lines realize they are playing a losing game as there is little hope of recovering the liquor that has been confiscated since the new regulations went into effect.
