### SEARCH FOR MISSING BODY OF BALLOONIST CONTINUES

PORT STANLEY, Ontario, July 10.-An intensive search by air and water craft failed to reveal the body of Lieutenant T. B. ### GIANT LINER MAKES

CHERBOURG, July 10 .- The gigantic American steamship Leviathan arrived here this morning on her first trip as a passenger liner under the stars and stripes. Eight hundred passengers disembarked and were taken to Paris in four special trains.
