(Continued from Page 1) and then have introduced in Congress an Alaskan omnibus bill, which will do away with the red tape that now throttles the demerit it attractive to settlers.

Rail Facilities Poor

Before either oil or coal can be got out of Alaska in any quantities there must first be transportation. And transportation in Alaska today is limited to some 500 miles of government railroad. The rest consists of trails and woods roads.

The complexity of governmental activities that govern the Territory, scattered through 35 different departments and bureaus, presents an enigma in itself that must be untangled before this country of vast resources can be opened up to settlement and development.

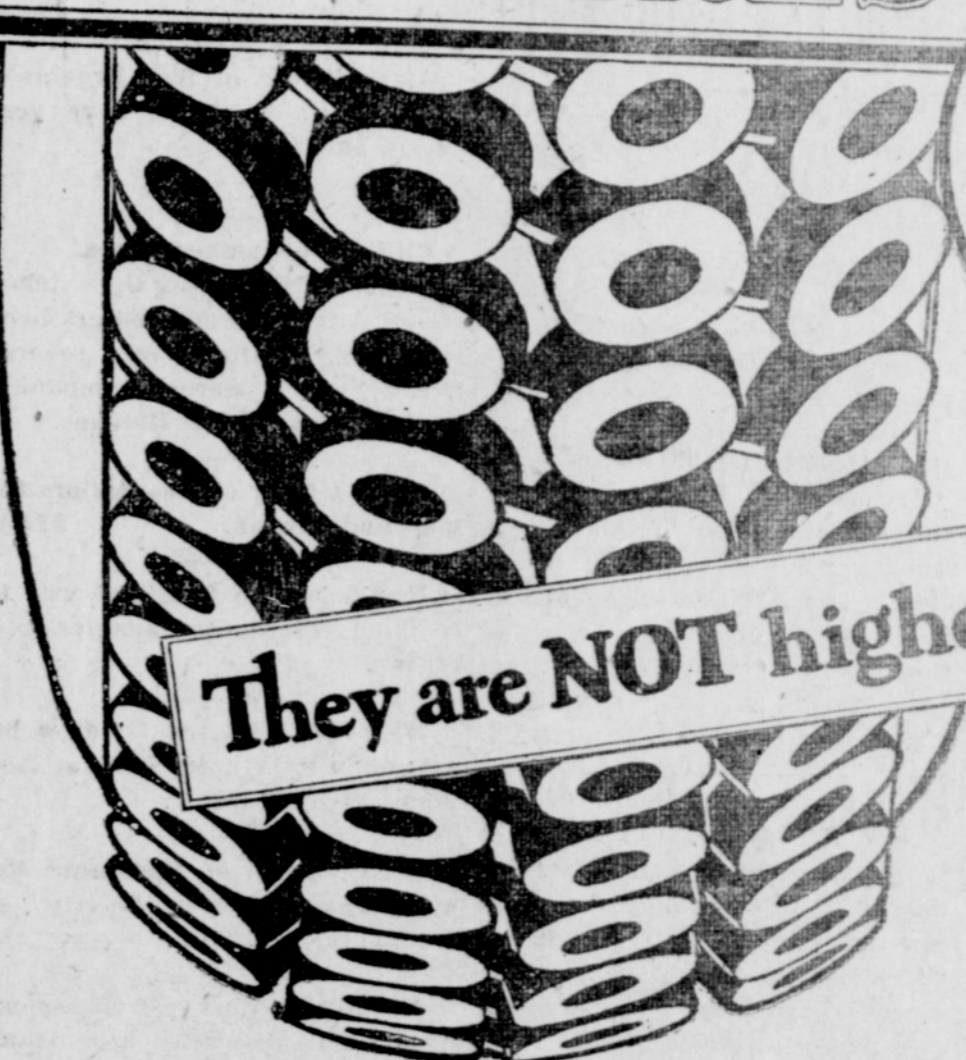
