LEGION ENDOWMENT FUND CONTRIBUTIONS LARGE

INDIANAPOLIS, July 20.—In seventeen states and territories of the United States and in six foreign countries, contributions to the American Legion Overseas Graves Endowment Fund have exceeded the amount set by national officers, according to reports of Robert H. Tyndall, national treasurer.

The states and territories are Rhode Island, Delaware, West Virginia, Maryland, Vermont, New Mexico, Connecticut, South Carolina, District of Columbia, Wyoming, Arizona, Washington, New Jersey, Georgia, Arkansas, Hawaii, and the Philippine Islands. The foreign countries are Japan, Canada, Mexico, Argentine Brazil and Cuba. These figures are based on amounts set on per capita membership in the legion.

Approximately five-eighths of the fund necessary for decoration in perpetuity of graves of American world war dead has been subscribed through the legion. Pennsylvania leads in the total amount collected, though Ohio is second by but a few hundred dollars. Subscriptions to the fund will be held open until reports are complete from all departments of the organization.
