PROHIBITION LEADER FACES CHARGE OF LARCENY

NEW YORK, July 25.—William Anderson Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of New York, was indicted by Grand Jury here today on the charges of grand larceny and forgery.

The charge grew out of alleged misuse of \$24,700 of the Anti-Saloon League funds. O. Phillips, a former collector for the Anti-Saloon League is the principal complaining witness.

Phillips told how he solicited funds on a commission and charged that Anderson had forged him to "split" his commissions. The forgery charge grew out of the State's allegation that Anderson ordered the books of the League altered to cover up the splitting commissions.

The case is very bitter as from the start churchmen, identified with the league, have appeared in his behalf. Bail has been fixed at \$5,000.

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS MEET

PORTLAND, July 21.—Law enforcement officials from all of the western states, Alaska, British Columbia and Alberta, are making preparations to attend the four-day conference of the northwest association of sheriffs and police, starting July 23rd and ending July 26th, President Harding's day.

Every Law Enforcement official; sheriffs, judges, prosecuting attorneys, chiefs of police, federal agents, and criminologists, comprise the membership of the association, officially organized to work out means for more effectively combating crime through adoption of new methods of criminal investigation and procedure, and to work for greater respect of law.

President Harding will be presented with an official badge of the association and pledged the co-operation and support of its members, in bringing about greater respect for law.

It is expected that over 400 law enforcement representatives will be present.
