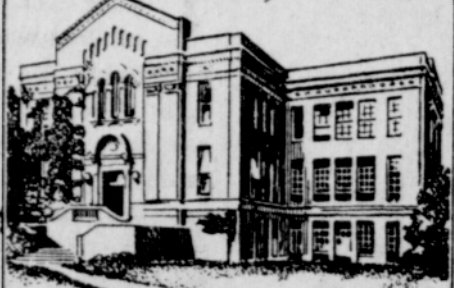

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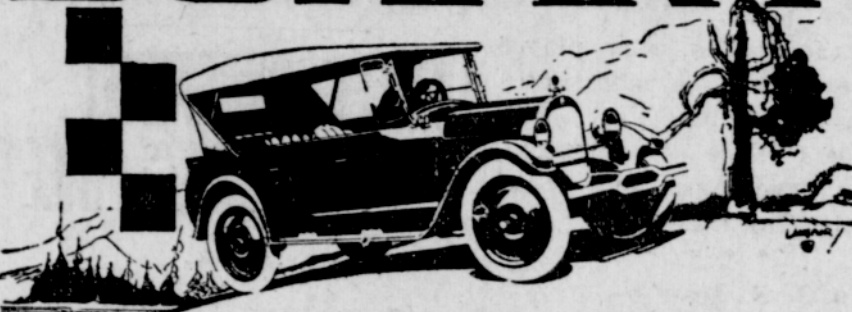

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—Co-operating with those in charge of the Monroe Doctrine Centennial and Motion Picture Exposition in the endeavor to add new attractions that will make the exposition so irresistible that everyone in Los Angeles will throng to the Rue de la Paix, the officials of the big Goodyear Los Angeles factories have arranged a novel and educational motion picture program that will be given daily at the Goodyear booth at the north end of the grounds. LOS ANGELES, July 21.—Among recent transccontinental motor trekkers to arrive in Los Angeles recently was one James Innes, who came to this country to represent British sporting goods manufacturers. MOTORCYCLE CABS ADOPTED IN PARIS

PARIS, July 21.—Four-wheeled, single-seated sidecar taxicabs were adopted by the Paris municipal council today. The rates will be 50 per cent cheaper than those of ordinary cabs. Two hundred and fifty of the cabs will be placed in operation in August. The taxis are reconstructed dispatch riders' motorcycles used during the war. Demountable tops cover the passengers from rain, but the drivers are exposed to the weather. The fare is 3 cents for the first third of a mile and then 1/2 a cent for every 200 yards and 30 cents an hour for waiting.

CAR SOLD EVERY OTHER DAY IS BUICK RECORD

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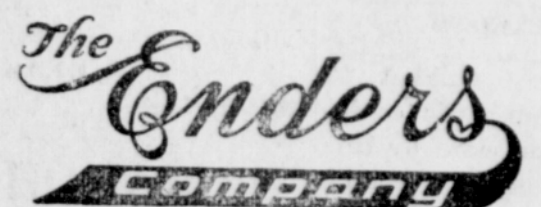
