SEALED PROPOSALS will be received by the Common Council of the City of Ashland, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m., Tuesday, August 7th, 1923, at the Recorder's Office in the City Hall, and such proposals will be opened and considered the same day and date at 8 o'clock p. m., for the construction and installation of a sewer in Sewer District No. 23, all pipe and material to be furnished by the Contractor.
