OREGON FORESTS REVENUE LARGE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 25.— Oregon has received a total of \$1,091,482 and Washington a total of \$512,703 during the past seventeen years from the 25 per cent fund of National Forest receipts. This information is given in a pamphlet called "National Forest Receipts for the Benefit of Schools and Roads," copies of which have just been received by the District Forester at Portland.

This pamphlet quotes the Act of Congress under which 25 per cent of all National Forest receipts are annually returned to the counties in which the forests are located for schools and roads, also the detailed figures for all states that benefit under this law, which has been effective since 1906. The pamphlet also gives detailed figures covering amounts expended in all states in which National Forests are located under the 10 per cent act for roads and trails within the National Forests, which law has been operative since 1912.

DAIRYMEN PLAN TO HAVE BIG PICNIC

At the last meeting that the Dairymen held at the Medford Hotel it was decided to hold a southern Oregon Dairymen's picnic. A committee was appointed to take charge of this affair. It has been decided by the committee to hold the picnic at the Jackson County Fair Grounds. The large Agricultural pavilion will be available for serving the lunch.

The grand stand can be used for the program and taking it all around the committee felt that it would be much better to hold the picnic on the fair grounds. All farmers, who are milking cows or interested in dairying are cordially invited to attend. It is now being planned to have a barbecue and farmers should bring a lunch. Coffee and meat will probably be served to all on the grounds.

A good program is being arranged. The farmers should gather at the Fair Grounds about 10 A. M., and the picnic will probably be over about 4 o'clock, in plenty of time to see President Harding, who goes through Medford on that date. The date of the picnic is Saturday, July 28.

Every person interested in dairying should make an effort to attend this picnic, as there will be some good things in store for all.

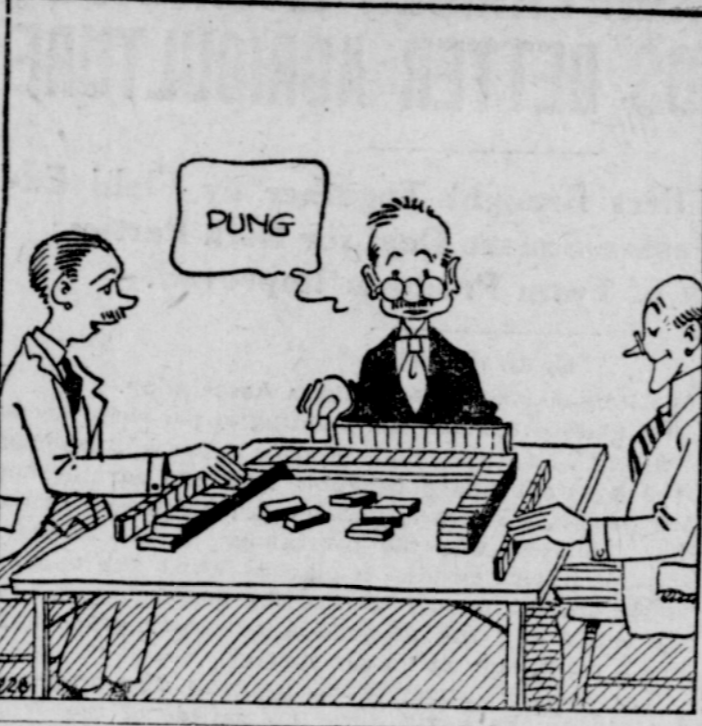

POWER COMPANY HAS MANY IMPROVEMENTS

Many thousands of dollars are being distributed in this locality to Stockholders of the California-Oregon Power Company by the Dividend Checks, to be mailed from the Home Office in Medford, on July 25.

Along with the Dividend Checks are being mailed letters to the stockholders, reporting matters of interest and importance during the past three months, among which are the purchase of the properties of the Douglas county Light and Water company, the completion of the 66,000 volt transmission line, Algom to Chiloquin, and the completion of construction and commencement of operation of the suction dredge on Upper Klamath lake as a part of the lake regulation project of the company; also the completion of the Central Warehouse in Medford.

In the letter to stockholders of April 25, it was stated that the three following construction undertakings were under way:

1. The construction of a 66,000-volt transmission line in Klamath county, Oregon, extending from Algom north to Chiloquin.

2. The construction of a suction dredge to operate on Upper Klamath lake in connection with the lake regulation of the company.

3. The re-construction of our transmission line from Fall Creek Power House to Yreka, California.

The first two of these jobs have been satisfactorily completed. Power is being supplied over the Chiloquin line and the suction dredge on Upper Klamath lake is in operation. Typical photographs illustrating these two new additions to the company's facilities are enclosed here.

LOCAL FIREMAN HURT IN WRECK

James McDonough Burned In Rail Smash At Sisson Late Last Night

James McDonough of Morton Street is at the Community Hospital suffering from painful burns as the result of a railroad wreck at Sisson last night. McDonough, who is a fireman on the Southern Pacific, was in the cab of a locomotive at Sisson, with the engine sitting at the place where a spur track connected with the main line.

The freight cars smashed into the cab of the engine in which McDonough was sitting, smashing in the side of the cab, breaking the steam pipes, and pinning the fireman in front of them.

Unable to escape, McDonough was badly burned, and was brought to Ashland and placed in the Community Hospital. For a time it was feared the effects of the burns might be fatal, but it later developed that while painful, the burns are not serious.

Engineer Bielski, who was also in the smashup was uninjured.

ASSOCIATIONS PLAN ORGANIZED SELLING

CORVALLIS, July, 25.—Agricultural cooperative selling associations recently organized in Oregon, or in course of organization, include the Malheur Cooperative Producers' association, Malheur county; Oregon Logan-berry Growers' Cooperative exchange, Marion county; Central Oregon Potato Growers' association, Deschutes county; and Clackamas county reports C. J. Hart, specialist in marketing for the college extension service, who assisted these groups in planning organization and preparing marketing agreements and contract forms.

These county potato associations are the beginning of what may develop into a statewide cooperative potato selling agency, said Mr. Hart. "They are organized under a constitution contract that is binding for three years which may be cancelled by the grower if he so desires after that length of time has elapsed. Completion of the Deschutes county association will depend upon whether or not 75 per cent of the acreage in the county can be signed up by September 1.

"I am now drafting a marketing agreement and contract for the Clackamas county association, to be submitted to a meeting of the growers at Oregon City July 25. The organization work will begin immediately thereafter and the association will be permanently formed when 200 acres have been signed up. This association will specialize in the production and sale of seek stock."

INDIAN TRIPS TO PORTLAND TO STOP

KLAMATH FALLS, July 25.—"Junkets" of Indians from the Klamath Indian reservation to Portland as witnesses in minor Indian cases occurring on the reservation are soon to be a thing of the past.

Fred A. Becker, superintendent on the reservation, has arranged to establish a jail on the reservation and a court of Indian offenses, presided over by three Indians and delegated with authority to deal with the minor misdemeanors of the Redmen.

In former days, an Indian charged with carrying a pint of booze on the reservation was sent to Portland for trial, and cited his friends subpoenaed at government expense, to come and testify for him.

OREGON GEOLOGISTS SPEAK IN CALIFORNIA

EUGENE, July 25.—Drs. W. D. Smith, E. T. Hodge and E. L. Packard, of the department of geology, have been asked to appear on the program of the Geological Society at its convention to be held in Los Angeles during September. Dr. Smith has also been asked to deliver an address before the Society of Petroleum Geologists on "the recent developments in oil prospecting in Oregon," and on the "petroleum possibilities in the Philippines."

During the next year, Dr. Smith will offer a course in general geology every Friday evening at the Portland Extension Center. The class will probably be held at the Lincoln High school in Portland, and laboratory and occasional field trips will be conducted on Saturdays. He will also teach advanced geology courses on this campus.

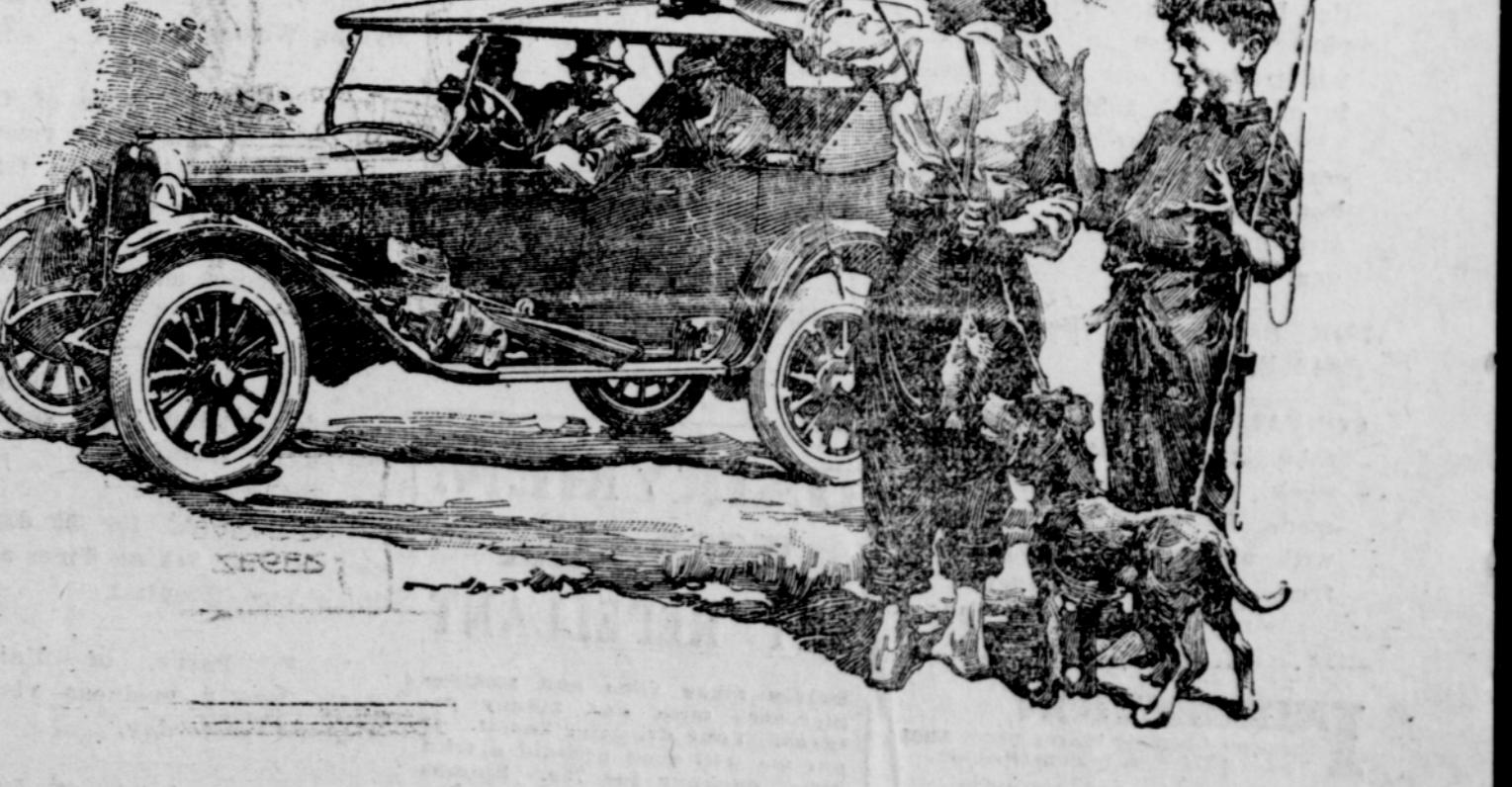
