SYRACUSE MAY DROP NAVY FROM SCHEDULE

SYRACUSE, N. Y., July 25.—Elimination of the Navy from the Syracuse rowing schedule and substitution of another college crew was proposed today by Coach James A. Ten Eyck, of the Orange institution of learning.

He advanced significant reasons for this apparently startling proposition, declaring that it was both unfair and inexpedient to pit the Orange oarsmen against the Middies in mid-May, when they were never able to get any more than half as much training by that time of the year as the Navy crews.

The Syracuse rowing mentor offered this proposition in no way as an alibi for previous defeats which his eight has suffered at the hands of the Annapolis lads, but said that it was an issue which should be settled for the welfare of the Orange oarsmen before another year rolls around.

Although the question cannot formally come before the university athletic governing board until next fall, it is not doubted that the coach's suggestion will be followed. The Navy being superseded by another eight for the May race.

This does not mean that Syracuse will not race the Navy yearly, for, as Ten Eyck pointed out his crew is always entered in the intercollegiate regatta. He stressed the point that Syracuse will even be desirous of meeting the Naval Academy crews every season, but that it was unjust competition for his boys to row such a high-calibre eight so early in the season. The Middies are always able to get on the water a month before the Hill crews.

Coach Ten Eyck volunteered no suggestions as to what university eight he would like to have substituted in the early season race other than to observe that it would be advantageous to race a crew which does not compete in the intercollegiate.

ITALIAN SHIP RUNS INTO LARGE WHALE

GENOA, Italy, July 25.—The extraordinary experience of running directly into a "veritable mountain of flesh," which stopped the vessel and covered her with blood from stem to stem, is related by the captain of the Italian ship Conte Verde, which arrived here recently from South America.

Shortly after their departure from Rio De Janeiro, the captain reported, the ship ran into a whale, while steaming at 20 miles an hour. The whole ship was shaken, and it was necessary to throw her into reverse to disengage her from the huge quantities of blood and the flesh torn from the sea mammal.

The water was red with blood and the air filled with an odor of fat and seaweed.

The captain of a vessel to the rear of the Conte Verde evidently thought the latter was in dire straits, when she suddenly reversed her engines, and signaled to ask whether assistance were needed.
