300 Loaves from a barrel of Flour



(National Crop Improvement Service.) ALTHOUGH there have been many new wheats introduced with alluring promises, yet repeated bread tests have proven that Marquis, Blue Stem and Pife are the only spring wheats which are of permanent value. Spring wheat always brings a premium over the other kinds of wheat because it brings the most money to the baker on account of its making more good loaves of bread from a barrel of flour. In the final analysis, wheat will always sell by sample on its milling quality. Wheat may be plump, heavy and

clean, but if the gluten content is of inferior quality, it will fail to bring the permanent demand, but choice spring wheat containing 12 to 14 per cent of the proper quality of bread gluten is always in demand.

A barrel of good flour should produce 300 one-pound loaves, and if the bread gluten is better than standard, the loaves in excess of 300 add materially to the baker's profit. This is why he is willing to pay more for hard spring wheat flour than for any other.

The importance of the quality of gluten in bread is one reason why farmers should be careful about plugging on new varieties, unproven as to commercial value. Until new wheats are proven to yield grain containing this proper quality bread gluten, planting them in large quantities is nothing but pure speculation. Leave experiments to your state experiment stations.

AMERICA BECOMING NATION OF TOURISTS

PORTLAND, July 23.—With fine hard roads stretching forth like so many ribbons through most sections of the country and with the development of motor cars to a point where they provide luxurious ease of travel and absolute dependability, America has become a nation of tourists. The fact is more pronounced this summer, with its vast increase of cars, than ever before.

"Literally hundreds of thousands of cars whose license tags bespeak great distances from home, dot the highways throughout the country during the summer months," says C. G. Wentworth of Wentworth & Irwin, local Nash dealers. LAX SUPERVISION CAUSES ACCIDENTS

NEW YORK, July 23.—Lax supervision of motor vehicle drivers and the resultant increase of 42 per cent in the automobile death rate during the last three years, is due to the fact that the majority of state legislators are from rural districts where strict examination and registration of drivers is not a vital matter, according to a report submitted by William J. Cox, traffic accident research engineer, to the National Bureau of Casuality and Surety Underwriters. There were 14,000 deaths from motor accidents last year, he said.

After a thorough investigation of the problem, and a careful examination of the records of some 300,000 accidents, Mr. Cox has prepared a table showing that registration and examination of all drivers is the only method of

stopping the rising number of traffic casualties.

In Maryland, Massachusetts and Connecticut, where strict supervision of drivers is maintained, casualties have fallen off 2 per cent, while increasing 42 per cent over the country. According to Mr. Cox's figures there would have been 4,309 fewer deaths from automobiles in 1922 had the percentage of these three states been universal.

"Only seven states require the examination of all motor vehicle operators," said the report "while 35 states require only chauffeurs to be licensed, and many of these are never examined. An automobile driver's license must be something to be acquired through merit, and not through the payment of half a dollar."

Real Food Puts Pep Into the Outing



THERE'LL be a hot time in the old town tonight, chances are, giving rise to an instinctive desire on the part of those who don't care for heat, humidity, and dust, to go out into the wide open spaces. The wide open spaces, it will be found on investigation, are not solely an attribute of the vanishing West, but are located in greater or less degree in the neighborhood of any town.

The average idea of an outing is to ride into the country, eat a soggy lunch of sandwiches, cake and other conglomeration, and then ride back to town with offended digestions. The simple life demands simple food. The only outdoor lunch over an open fire.

Perhaps the feminine appetite is satisfied with dainties, but the masculine is not. As a compromise, when camp cookery is contemplated, it is a good idea to take along the "makings" of a salad. Head lettuce and Spanish green olives are a zestful combination. The hearts of lettuce should be

crisped in a cool spring or stream. Then the tender leaves and tangy olives should be cut up into a bowl, and dressing added. Bacon and eggs are about the finest piece of resistance that ever sputtered over the coals. Carefully scrubbed potatoes, a little flour twisted into a paper, coffee, buttered buns, a small can of condensed milk, and seasoning are desirable supplies.

A small fire, between two flat stones or small green logs. Potatoes baked or boiled with their jackets on! The coffee, sewed into a clean muslin bag at home, put on in cold water. When the water boils the coffee is done, and done right. Save the bacon grease (the eggs need only a little) for gravy. Stir flour into the hot grease, and add part water and part condensed milk when the flour is brown, stirring until it thickens. That's a meal! Skillet, kettle, and coffee pot will have to be carried home, but after a dinner like that in the wide open spaces, who cares?
