This country, in time of urgent need, can support itself. But in normal times its prosperity depends upon its commercial relations with the markets of the world. Prosperity for Americans is represented by the surplus products they are able to export. This market for surplus diminishes; today it has reached an unprecedented low point The government reports show this to be so. Reports from business men all over the land prove the reports to be true.

It is a fact that the steady demoralization of Europe, dragged down remorselessly by the dead weight of failing, helpless Germany, has checked American welfare and must do so more in proportion as Europe's capacity to do business grows less.

However, unfavorably Americans generally have regarded the Ruhr occupation, criticism has been singularly restrained France is supporting huge armaments. She has the largest disciplined army of the world. She has more aircraft than anyone else. She has great supplies of guns and munitions and the factories to produce more She owes money which she makes no mention of paying, although she has financed recently two smaller powers, on whose armed friendship she relies. With her disregard for her own debts she is furiously insistent that Germany pay her uttermost farthing, the while she seizes German workshops and snarls a surly defiance at any effort to compromise a situation that marches swiftly to general ruin and the incalcuable misery of Europe.

The propaganda for her case of hatred has been considerable. In its most familiar phase it is a sentimental plea, heard here and there among our own people, that the French debts should be cancelled. These petitious comes not infrequently from anxious folks who purchased or financed the purchase of French government bonds. These bonds they have no desire to see cancelled. They prefer the American taxpayer pay for them by assuming the equivalent of the French debt.
