

FUNERAL CHAPEL WILL BE MODERN STRUCTURE

Plans are being drawn by Frank Clark, a Medford architect, for a modern Undertaking Parlor and funeral chapel, which will be erected in the near future by J. P. Dodge and sons on their property on Pioneer avenue.

The new chapel will be one of the best in Southern Oregon and will have a frontage of 43 by 85 feet, covering the entire Dodge lot on Pioneer avenue.

The building will incorporate all of the modern improvements to be found in the most up-to-date chapels, and will be a cement structure of mission style architecture. Before work was started on the plans, Will Dodge took a trip through the northern part of the state, visiting many undertaking establishments and looking for improvements which will be used to make the Ashland chapel one of the best.

One of the unusual features of the building will be a fire-proof preparation room and slumber room. These rooms will be made of cement throughout, with steel doors and casing, making them absolutely fire proof. This feature is one of the latest innovations, and is not to be found in any other undertaking parlor in southern Oregon.

BUTLER PLANS MORE MODERN BUNGALOWS

When the plans of J. F. Butler are completed, Van Ness avenue will be one of the most modern and beautiful streets in the city.

A little over a year ago, Mr. Butler, realizing the need of small bungalows, built two on what was then Mechanic street, and there was such a demand for them that he decided to build up the entire street from Laurel to Helman streets.

Mr. Butler now has building rights on practically all the vacant lots on the street, and in the course of time, hopes to have modern bungalows on all of them.

Another one, which is being built by Putnam brothers on the former site of an out of date house, will soon be completed, and another one is to be built at the side of it as soon as possible. All together, three more will be built side by side, construction work starting on one as soon as the one before it is finished.

In order to beautify the street, concrete lamp posts will be placed at proper intervals replacing the present lights which stand in the middle of the street. At each corner, Mr. Butler plans a large pillar rock, bearing a flower vase.

A trade entrance to all houses on the block will be built directly back of them, so that all supplies can be unloaded where they are wanted, without any trouble.

According to local realty agents, there is a great demand for four and five-room housekeeping bungalows, on small plots of ground, and the owner of such a modern bungalow has no difficulty in renting or selling it for a high price, as modern homes are in great demand, and people who move here to send their children to school, or for their health want small convenient homes.
