Of \$3500. TIMBER ON NEW LAND AMBULANCE FUND MAY BE LOGGED SOON

Council Authorizes

Purchase Of 230 Acres

Of Additional Land In

Ashland Canyon For Sum

Land Will Be Taxed After Lumbering Operations Are Begun. Bids For Sewer Extensions Are Accepted.

The City of Ashland now owns practically all of the land included in the Ashland Creek watershed as the result of the purchase of 230 acres of land near the head of the watershed from

Martin Brothers. This purchase has been considered for some time, and at the regular meeting of the city council last night, the action was taken. The price paid for the holdings was \$3500, and represents a \$500 reduction in the price that was demanded of a

previous council. Has Been Policy It has has been the policy of previous councils, according to Mayor Loomis, to add to the city holdings in the watershed as fast as financial conditions would permit, and a reasonable price could be obtained. This policy of expantion has been carried out in the present coun-

cil, and now nearly all the land along the watershed as far as 20.00 the government holdings, which can not be purchased, are owned by the city. Only about 150 acres of the complete watershed remains in private hands, and will be purchased as soon as practicable.

May Be Logged There is a fine body of standing timber on the recent addition to the watershed, and the council is considering logging part of it as fast as new growth will be sufficient to hold the water and insure a steady sup-

It is believed that there is a sufficient quantity of fine timber to pay for the cost of the holdings, and that the scrub timber, which could be made into fire wood could also be sold.
