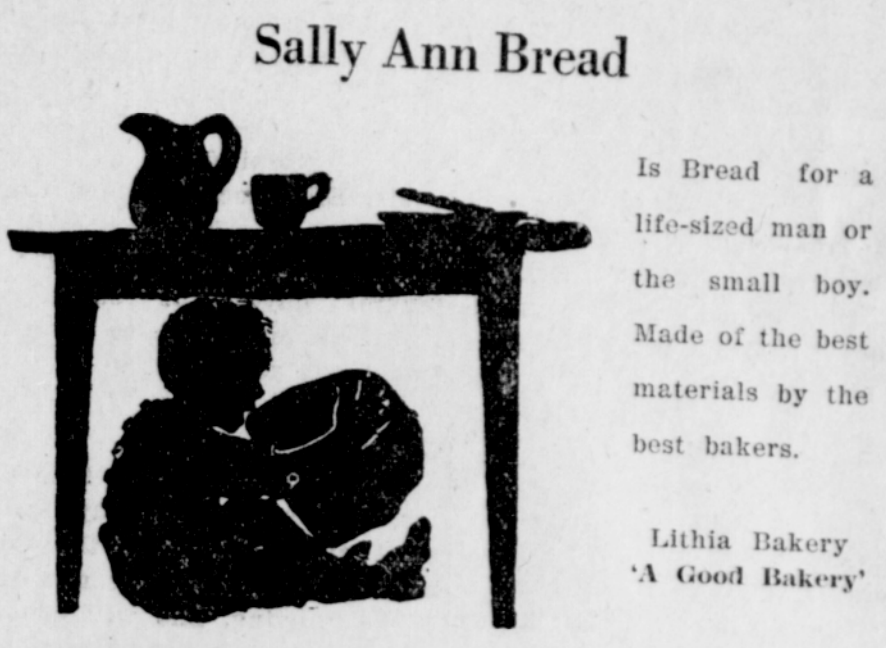

marked in raw materials and foodstuffs. Raw silk, for example, an extremely important manufacturing material for which we are entirely dependent on foreign countries, shows an average import price of \$7.77 per pound in December, 1922, compared with \$6.59 at the same month of 1921, and an average annual price of \$8.90 per pound in 1919, \$4.61 in 1917, and \$3.09 in 1915.

The closing month of the preceding year, so do woolen cloths, burials, chemical wood pulp unbleached mats and matting, and shingles. These import prices are distinctly representative of conditions abroad, since under the law the prices named when the articles enter the country are those prevailing in the foreign markets from which the merchandise is sent to the United States, and thus are a distinct and sharp picture of the average advances which have occurred in the various parts of the world from which the imports are drawn.

REDDING PROPERTY ATTACHED BY BANK

REDDING, Calif., Aug. 8.—All the Shasta county mining property of Trinity Copper company was attached this week by the Federal National Bank of Boston to recover on notes given in May last year and endorsed by Thomas W. Lawson, Boston trader in copper stocks. Judgment is asked for \$46,620. It is alleged that the interest was paid in November, but since then not a cent has been paid on the demand notes, and Lawson has disappeared from Boston.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Theodore Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the Navy, and one of the founders of the American Legion, has offered a silver cup to the legion post in New York which procures the largest number between July 1 and August 13, according to an announcement made by Albert S. Callan, commander of the New York department of the legion. This trophy will be known as the "Theodore Roosevelt Cup." It will be presented to the winning post at the state convention of the legion which will be held at Saratoga Springs, September 13, 14 and 15.
